

The company works co-operatively with other organisations in pursuit of its charitable objectives. These include statutory bodies in the field of Health and Social work, Education providers, other charities and groups that are appropriate to the furtherance of such objectives. The Trustees of Networks of Wellbeing Ltd recognise that there are risks to which the charity is exposed. These relate in the main to external factors such as political, social or financial pressures and priorities.

- 1. Continued funding The Charity is dependant on funding from the local authority, grant funding from bodies such as the National Lottery and fundraising activities.
- 2. Continued referrals from Health, Social Work and the Community.
- 3. Continued ability to recruit and retain well-motivated and trained staff.
- 4. Ability to provide or obtain appropriate training for staff to maintain a level of professionalism in line with the requirements of the local Authority Service Level Agreement.

The Trustees have a continuing responsibility to evaluate and review the performance of the company and the risks to which it is exposed. It is their responsibility to initiate any appropriate actions required as a consequence of this process to ensure future viability. The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the company is currently exposed and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to major risks. In particular those related to the operations and finances of the company.

Objectives and activities

The charitable objectives and activities undertaken by Networks of Wellbeing Ltd are detailed below. In order to evaluate performance against these objectives quantitative and qualitative measures are used. These range from attendance records, group/activity evaluation forms, discussion with individuals and service user forums and individual service users recovery plans. Whilst it is difficult to measure well-being, confidence, motivation and social inclusion, these activities enable us to broadly assess the success of the service provided.

Networks of Wellbeing Ltd provides a range of services for people aged from 16 years with no upper age limit. In order to engage and meet the mental health and well-being needs of our community we aim to continually develop a client centred, holistic approach, delivering a meaningful programme of activities in partnership with the people involved.

We aim to provide a positive, supportive and non-judgemental environment where encouragement and practical assistance is offered during the process of recovery, social inclusion and the development of emotional resilience. It is our intention to enable people to achieve their maximum potential as individuals.

We cover a broad range of community-based activities - including social, physical and recreational. We also offer opportunities to experience and develop work-based skills through our environmental themed projects e.g. community allotments and orchard, round wood shelter building and community tree planting.

We are well supported locally and there is a lot of interest in what we are doing - especially with regard to the outward facing approach we adopt in our working practices and service delivery.

We aim to work collaboratively with local and national partners to deliver effective and inclusive projects that impact positively on local people and places.

We now collaborate with over 30 groups and organisations in order to deliver an integrated health and well-being approach and avoid duplication of effort. These collaborations include Community Learning & Development in the employability group; Deveron Arts with the walking group and White Wood Group; Aberdeenshire Voluntary Action - with regards to dementia friendly workers; Aberdeenshire Council Substance Misuse Team - on the pallet recycling group, Chillin' Women group, Community Allotments, and Dru Yoga and relaxation classes; Huntly Development Trust's (HDDT) Sports Hub and Ladies Taster Days; and HDDT and Huntly Rinnin Quines and Loons to develop and deliver the Hutnly 5k Fun Run.

It is clear that we are a local charity that prioritises social connection and brings individuals, groups and the wider community together to support activities aimed at increasing peoples happiness, wellbeing and resilience.

The Company's objectives are:

To promote Mental Health issues.

To release information regarding the facilities and services available in AB54 postcode area and beyond, including (but not limited to) Aberchirder, Blacklaw, Cabrach, Cairnie, Clatt, Drumblade, Forgue, Gartly, Glass, Glenbarry, Glendronach, Huntly, Insch, Kennethmont, Knock, Largue, Lumsden, Rhynie, Rothiemay, Ruthven and Ythanwells.

Achievements and performance

Chairman's Report for 2016/17

It has been an exciting year, with many changes but more ups than downs. The board has lost Matt Greenhalgh, Patrick Wright and Sandy Mack. Board members are now Sandra Brantingham (Chair), Jill Sowden (Minutes Secretary), Alastair Ross (Treasurer), and Hilda Lumsden-Gill, making a total of 4, however Sharon Francis & Christine Sell have agreed to join the board at the April meeting..

On the staff side,we have 5 people employed, Fiona Alderson (Manager), Fiona Thompson (Deputy Manager), Maria Perkins, Darren Farquhar and Matt Donaldson. In addition we have contracted Ann Massie for 12 hours per week which is sufficient to handle our present needs.

This has enabled the centre to provide a meaningful service without putting too much strain on the finances, however with the slow start of SAMH, the staff are now under increasing pressure. We liaise with other organisations including Aberdeenshire Council Substance misuse, Central Forum ADP, HDDT, Deveron Projects and The Gordon Schools to enable us to provide a seamless and effective solution to peoples needs.

Despite all the changes, we have still had many groups operating, (see pamphlet). the allotments attracting many people, the tea dance going strong, the bike shack going from strength to strength. Other major events undertaken were "Room to Run" organised by F1 in conjunction with HDDT and "Loons and Quines". The café we have rented in the centre of town is no longer viable and we are in the process of terminating the lease.

Council funding ended on 31st January 207 and we became an independant organisation. We were successful in bidding for lottery funding of £149,500 for 3 years from 1st January 2017 which has enabled the group to start a 5 year business plan.

The link up with HDT over Greenmyres farm is ongoing with several possibilities opening up.

In conclusion, despite going through some heavy weather and many changes, we are running well, and although we do not have as much money as before, we are now guaranteed to be still operating in December 2020.

I would like to thank the board, the staff, the volunteers and all our members as well as other individuals & organisations who have worked very hard to keep us going. I do believe we will keep going in the years to come and that more funding will become available.

Manager's Report for 2016/17

Networks of Wellbeing Ltd continues to make a significant contribution to local Mental Heath and Wellbeing services in the AB54 area and beyond.

NoW is a member-led grassroots organisation that is well supported by a diverse range of volunteers who are enthusiastic about individual and community health improvements. We actively listen and respond to individual and community need, which means our activities have evolved into creative and dynamic health interventions. Our most successful activities are based on ideas suggested by people in Recovery who have lived experience of mental health difficulties. Before the idea is developed into a group activity we refer to:

- The New Economics Foundation 5 Ways to Wellbeing as a reference point for the basic wellbeing needs of all people. http:
- Scottish National Outcomes with particular reference to, Strong Resilient and Supportive Communities and Healthier Lives http:
- Aberdeenshire Council's Community Plan 2016 Action points 3.2 http:

The idea is then developed using volunteerism, co-production, creative action, and collaborative working practices so that many outputs are achieved from each activity.

Challenges 2016/17

During 2016/17 NoW faced a major challenge in that Aberdeenshire Council completely redesigned their service specification (for what was traditionally termed 'day services') for people with mental health problems across Aberdeenshire. In January 2017 Aberdeenshire Council ceased funding mental health provision in the way they had done for the previous 10 years. The Council's focus moved to supporting people aged between 16 and 65 with moderate, substantial and critical levels of need and a new, national, provider was contracted to deliver these services. This led to a period of uncertainty for NoW during which the staff, supported by the Board, and in particular our Treasurer, put together a funding application to submit to the Big Lottery. This resulted in NoW being fortunate enough to secure 3 years funding from the Big Lottery Community Led Award scheme. Coupled with our reserves, this funding will allow us to continue to provide a service to people of all ages in the area.

Over the last 12 months we have:

- Expanded our range of activities in the community thanks to the drive and resourcefulness of our staff and volunteers and our community collaborators and partners.
- Operated a person-centered, accessible service where individual and community strengths and aspirations are recognised, listened to, and incorporated within the services we provide.
- Identified and used local community resources to assist in delivery of projects, which has proved beneficial to both individuals and to the organisation.
- Worked in partnership with other organisations (e.g. Aberdeenshire Council Substance Misuse, Central Forum ADP, HDDT, Deveron Projects) to provide options for improved mental health and wellbeing within our communities.
- Started a Counselling service with a volunteer Counsellor for those in need within our community.
- Co-hosted (with HDDT and Huntly Rinnin Quines and Loons) the 5K and 10K 'Room to Run'

Huntly Fun Run.

- Been awarded funding from the Jo Walters Trust to run a cycling activity with SFL pupils at The Gordon Schools, Huntly.
- Developed and delivered, with a range of local partners, a summer cycling activity for young people who may otherwise have been at risk of committing offences.
- Worked with Keith Grammar School and Turriff Academy to provide alternative choices for hard to engage with young people.
- Started a Cognitive Stimulation Therapy Group (based in Scott's Hospital and open to community members) for people with mild to moderate stages of dementia.
- Further developed our Silver Singers activity to include Scotts Hospital and the dementia unit in `the Meadows Care Home in Huntly.
- Provided Peer Support training for service users and staff which led to the forming of a busy Peer Support Group. This enabled our service users to provide informal support to another group in Aberdeenshire.
- Received funding for and hosted 3 nights of a Huntly Wellbeing Film Festival as part of the Aberdeenshire Wellbeing Festival in 2016.
- Developed a monthly Language and Culture Cafe to celebrate and share the diversity of nationalities of those living and working in our community.
- Worked in partnership with the local substance misuse team to support the Chillin' Women group and relaxation classes.
- Benefitted from the fund-raising activities of Glass Community Association and re-invested that money in a piece of intergenerational work in the community.
- Continued to host and support the monthly Tea Dance, with attendance from residents of 3 care homes, providing an opportunity for people to socialise and feel included in their community.
- Continued to expand the Cycling Connections project. This includes working in schools with hard
 to engage with young people, as well as promoting the Bike Shack as a supported volunteer
 project and recycling initiative where donated bikes are refurbished and sold at low cost.
- Promoted our work through the use of our website, www.networksofwellbeing.org our facebook page and the AB54 Community Newsletter.
- Continued to produce a quarterly AB54 Community Newsletter highlighting the with a paper circulation of 2500 paper copies and an online reach via organisations such as MAP, HDDT and others.
- Recognised the high quality of work done by our staff and volunteers and received a Runner Up Award in the Inspiring Aberdeenshire Awards for 2017 (which celebrates and recognises the best of community spirit across Aberdeenshire).

Through delivering our services in an inclusive and supportive community environment we continue to move from the isolation and dependency that can be a by-product of traditional day service provision.

What we have achieved by the above actions, is a move from the isolation and dependency that can be a by-product of traditional day service provision. We now deliver our services in an inclusive and supportive community environment.

We aim to work with individuals and the wider community to create socially inclusive opportunities. By engaging and including the whole community we create the conditions for inclusion.

Financial review

The Statement of Financial Activities shows incoming resources of £155,332 (2016 - £115,783) and resources expended of £120,402 (2016 - £120,119), giving a surplus for the year of £34,930 (2016 deficit of £4,336).

At 31 March 2017 the charity held restricted funds of £38,800 (2016 £13,594) and unrestricted funds of £87,584 (2016: £77,860).

The trustees hold reserves at a level to meet the ongoing expenses of the company together with a contingency amount to meet any one-off unexpected costs.

Funds have been secured from the Big Lottery Fund for the Project Account. This funding has been secured for 3 years. It will fund salaries, staff training and expenses, volunteer training and exenses, administration and overhead costs. It will also contribute towards the salaries of service manager, development worker and three support workers.

Plans for future periods

Over the next three years Networks of Wellbeing Ltd's aim is to continue to develop and deliver projects in and around the AB54 postcode area. We will continue to grow our partnership and joint working arrangements. This will include the development of joint working agreements; information sharing arrangements; clear referral process and protocols; and joint training activity.

Networks of Wellbeing will obtain feedback and views on current service provision; identify issues in relation to current practice; identify gaps in service provision and future areas of development. This information and consultation will be used to feed into long term strategic planning for the organisation and is essential to seeking additional funding for our service to continue.

We will continue to use 'The Clashmach Center' as our base. This premises is an office, drop in space, and includes 2 dedicated portacabins for the Cycling Connections - Bike Shack Project. This well-known building provides a safe, secure, and welcoming space - which we know is highly valued by those who access our services. We will deliver (link-in) activity in remoter rural locations, using community buildings and the outdoor environment e.g. schools, community center, community hall, woodlands, residential care homes and sheltered housing, village halls and village parks.

We will work in a collaborative multi-agency manner with public, private, and third sector organisations. We will further develop our partnerships with a number of local and regional partners including; Aberdeenshire Council's Community Learning and Development, Care management and Substance Misuse Teams; Aberdeenshire Voluntary Action; Bydand Medical Center; Deveron Projects; Huntly and District Development Trust; Gordon Rural Action; The Gordon Schools, Huntly; NHS Public Health-Coordinator for the Marr area; and the University of Aberdeen.

Collaborative working means that we can all help to deliver community wide health interventions that are diverse, inclusive, intergenerational and of lasting benefit both to the people we support, and to our wider community. It also means that the duplication of health interventions is reduced, and that our ability to signpost people appropriately is increased.

Networks of Wellbeing Ltd is experienced in the provision of preventative work and in working with those with mild to moderate needs and our primary focus for the future will continue be in this area.

I would like to pay tribute to the staff team and volunteers at NoW for all of their dedication, hard work and commitment. Without them, and the support of our Board and of our community, none of the work we do would be possible.

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The charity is a private company limited by guarantee, registered in Scotland and a registered charity in Scotland. The address of the registered office is The Clashmach Centre, 18 Steven Road, Huntly, Aberdeenshire, AB54 8SX.

2. STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charity Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

3. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BASIS OF PREPARATION

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

GOING CONCERN

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

TRANSITION TO FRS 102

The entity transitioned from previous UK GAAP to FRS 102 as at 1 April 2015. Details of how FRS 102 has affected the reported financial position and financial performance is given in note 19.

FUND ACCOUNTING

Funds held by the charity are either

Unrestricted general funds:

General funds - General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the directors in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds - Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the directors for particular purposes.

Restricted funds:

These are funds which can be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular purposes.

INCOMING RESOURCES

Income

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income, any performance related conditions attached have been met or are fully within the control of the charity, the income is considered probable and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Donations and legacy income is received by way of donations, legacies, grants and gifts and
 is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Where legacies
 have been notified to the charity but the criteria for income recognition have not been met,
 the legacy is treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material. Grants, where
 entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are
 recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.
- Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity, being the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market.
- Investment income is included when receivable.
- Income from charitable trading activity is accounted for when earned.
- Income from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

RESOURCES EXPENDED

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

- Costs of raising funds comprise the costs associated with attracting donations, grants and legacies and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.
- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its
 activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly
 to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.
- Other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.
- All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis designed
 to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly,
 others are apportioned on an appropriate basis, as set out in the notes to the accounts.

TANGIBLE ASSETS

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost.
