This will include consultation on the Main Issues Report (including any subsequent Proposed Plan).

I also agree that following the end of the consultation, i.e. after 8 April 2019, my name and respondent identification number (provided to you by Aberdeenshire Council on receipt of your submission) can be published alongside a copy of my completed response on the Main Issues Report website (contact details and information that is deemed commercially sensitive will not be made available to the public).

The data controller for this information is Aberdeenshire Council. The data on the form will be used to inform a public debate of the issues and choices presented in the Main Issues Report of the Aberdeenshire Local Development Plan 2021. It will inform the content of the Proposed Aberdeenshire Local Development Plan.

Aberdeenshire Council will only keep your personal data for as long as is needed. Aberdeenshire Council will retain your response and personal data for a retention period of 5 years from the date upon which it was collected. ### Your Data, Your Rights

**Your comments**

The Settlement Statement for Logie Coldstone, when compared to other villages is very negative, please consider a more pro-active description to reflect the village, similar to those of Clatt and Lumphanan.

Logie Coldstone has a thriving Community, the Hall is used every day for Community Groups and a successful Community Café is held every month. When compared to larger villages this is remarkable in the Aberdeenshire area, especially Deeside, and should be actively acknowledged and encouraged by Aberdeenshire Council.

In order to try and keep our younger generation and promote the village in general, it would be beneficial for a site for housing to remain in the Local Area Development Plan, this would at least give a potential for affordable housing and at most encourage new families to the area.

(You may be aware that our local Estate, which housed many families in rented accommodation has changed hands, and as such depleted the housing stock for the area.)

Should the Site next to the hall remain in the Plan it also offers potential for a playpark for the local children and possibility for a 'village centre'.

Aboyne School is struggling to cope with pupil numbers, the potential for Logie Coldstone School is considerable, perhaps pupils from Dinnet can be offered this alternative, if they are not already.
