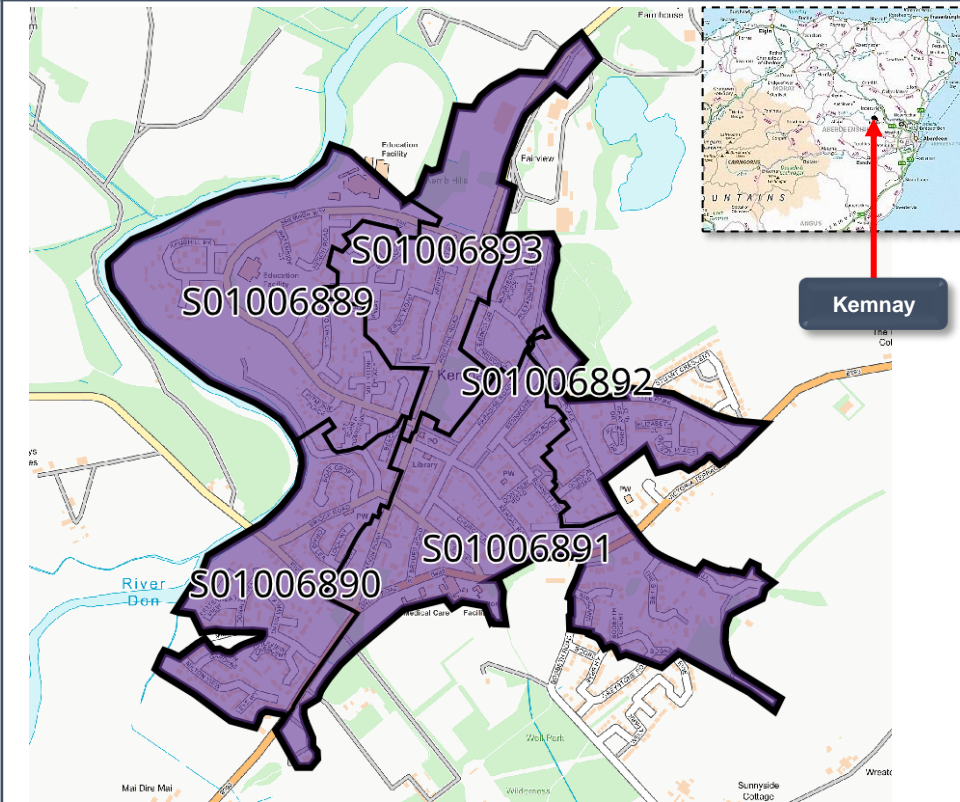

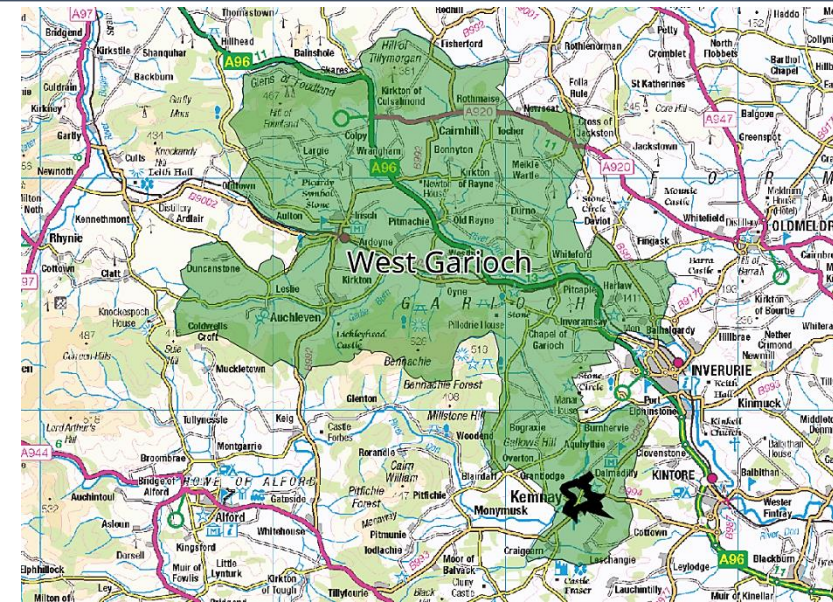

Notes on the Maps

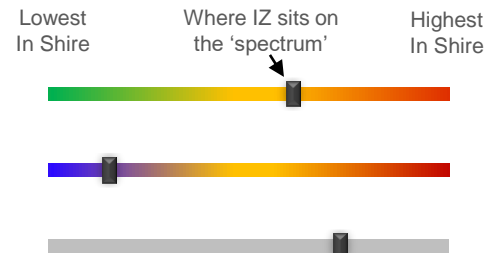
The map on the left shows the location and geographic area of the Kemnay Intermediate Zone. It contains 5 Data Zones.

Only one MMW straddles the Intermediate Zone (West Garioch).

Spectrum Charts Explained

The following statistical pages frequently utilise spectrum charts as a visual aid to accompany an indicator. They are used to place the relevant Intermediate Zone (IZ) in the context of all other IZs in Aberdeenshire with regards to that indicator.

The charts to the right are examples of the spectrum charts used in this report. The black line represents where the IZ sits in the context of the highest and lowest figures in Aberdeenshire. If the black line is situated towards the left-hand side, the IZ recorded one of the lowest figures in Aberdeenshire. Conversely, if the black line is towards the right-hand side, it recorded one of the highest figures in Aberdeenshire.



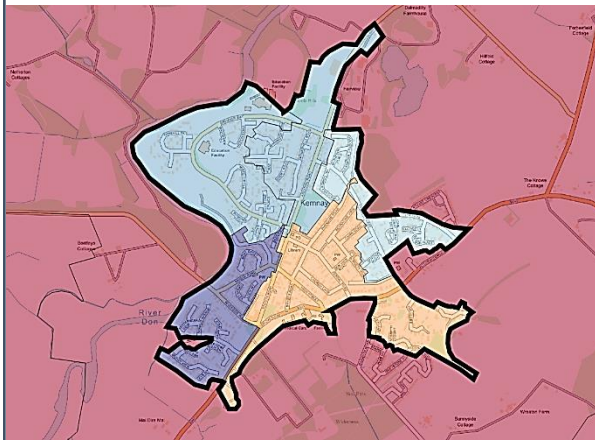
The green/red spectrum charts are the most common type. If the black line is situated towards the red end of the spectrum, it means the figure is objectively worse than most other IZs in Aberdeenshire and vice versa.

The blue/red spectrum charts are used in the demographic section to denote high population growth (red) and population decline (blue).

The grey spectrum charts are simply used to denote high and low in the context of Aberdeenshire, where the high / low figure is neither good nor bad. An example would be the proportion of dwellings that fall within Council Tax Bands F-G.

## Kemnay Demographic Data

The population in this IZ decreased by 5.7% between 2014 and 2021, which is towards the lower end of the spectrum in an Aberdeenshire context (i.e., towards depopulation). Note: the area immediately outside the town saw considerable growth.

All DZs registered a decrease, with DZs running the length of the centre of town experiencing the greatest proportionate declines over the period covered.

The greatest percentage decrease was registered by DZ S01006890 (-10.4%), which covers the south-west portion of the town, running alongside the River Don. The reason for the reduction is largely due to fewer people in younger age groups (40's and younger).

The increase in the number of people belonging to older age groups was not enough to offset the reduction among the younger demographic. But as a consequence of this trend, those aged 60+ account for a far higher proportion of the population in this DZ, now standing at 36%, up from 23% in 2014.

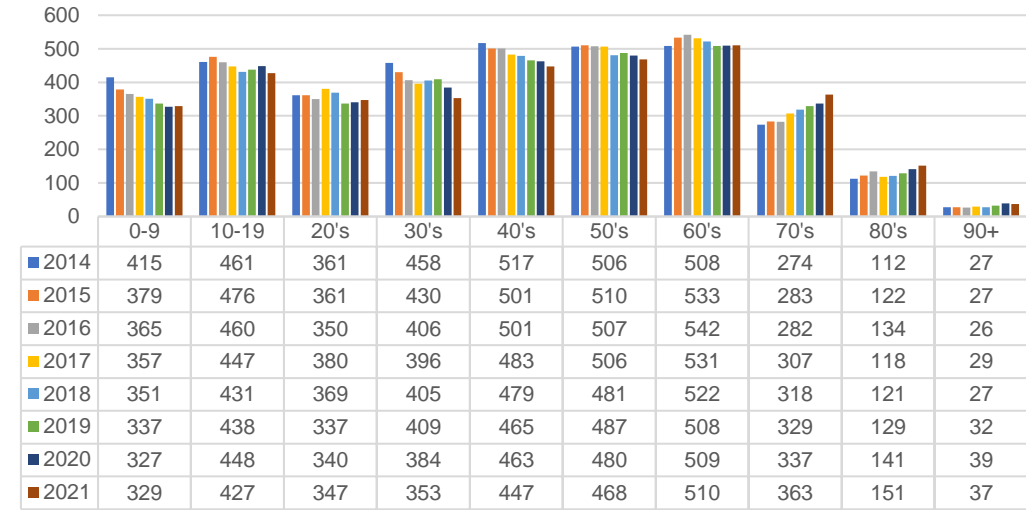
This is a pattern reflected across the IZ, although not to the same extent.

As a result, the IZ has a slightly different age profile than Aberdeenshire in that those in their 60's comprise the greatest number (in Aberdeenshire it's those in their 50's). The IZ also has a slightly lower proportion of people aged 0-9 compared to the Shire.

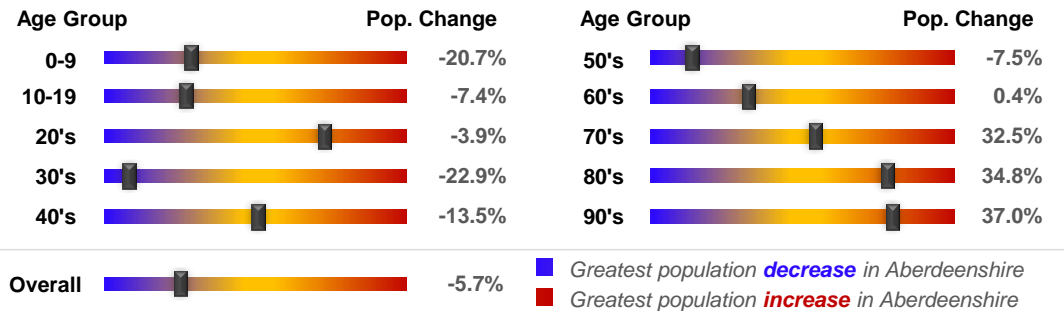

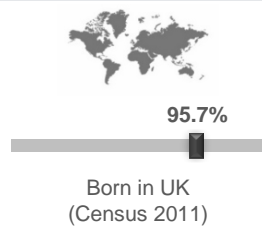
### Population per Age Group, Kemnay, 2014-2021



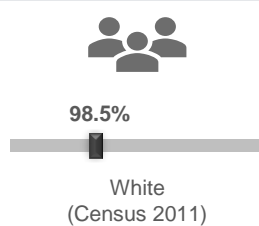
### Rate of Population Change per Age Group, 2021 Compared to 2014



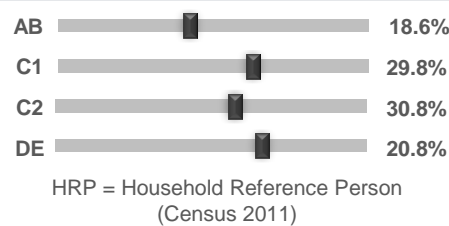

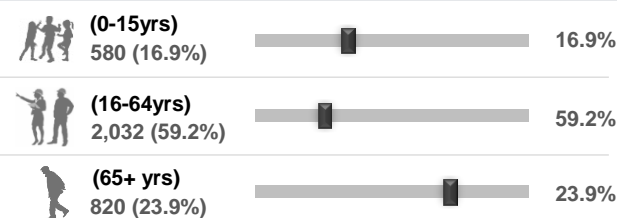

### Population per Broad Age Group, 2021



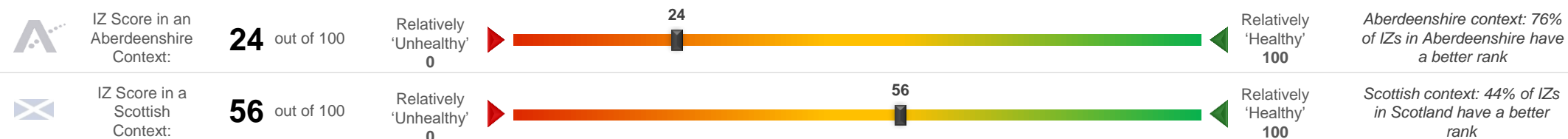
In 2021 3,432 people lived in Kemnay -- 580 (16.9%) were under 15 years of age, 2,032 (59.2%) were aged 16-64, and 820 (23.9%) were over 65.

The number of households with Limited Work Capability or LWC (due to physical or mental health issues) has remained relatively high since the peak period, now affecting 54 households, up from 13 in January 2020. The IZ figure of 3.4% of households with at least 1 occupant assessed as having LWC is towards the higher end of the spectrum in a Shire context, and an increase compared to the previous reporting cycle.</p> <p>A higher proportion of the Working Age Population (3.7%) receive Personal Independence Payments (PIPs). This helps with some of the extra costs caused by long-term disability, ill-health or terminal ill-health. The IZ trend has increased in line with the Aberdeenshire trend. Again, the 3.7% figure is relatively high compared to most other IZs in Aberdeenshire.</p> <p>According to SIMD 2020 data, DZ S01006890 has the best health ranking (southwest portion of town, from Beech Court to Milton View - this is one of the best health rankings in Scotland) and S01006892 has the 'worst' (east part of town, covering Fyfe Park, Fraser Place and Alexander Crescent).</p>

Based on the 24 health-related indicators in the table, this IZ is situated towards the more vulnerable end of the spectrum in an Aberdeenshire context. The IZ fares a bit better when all IZs in Scotland are taken into consideration, making it into the top half nationally. (It's in the bottom 25% in Aberdeenshire.)

That said, the area compares favourably to most other areas in Scotland in terms of a range of health-related outcomes, particularly in relation to Patients hospitalised with asthma; Immunisation uptake at 24 months - MMR; and Developmental concerns at 27-30 months. In each instance the area is in the top 10% in Scotland.

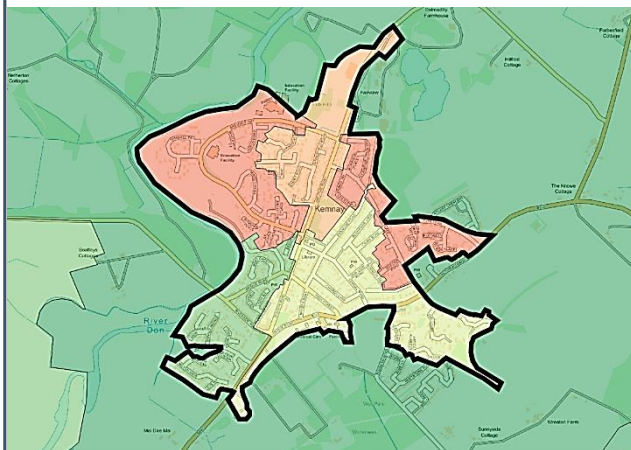
Issues that may require further investigation include:

- Patients hospitalised with COPD;
- Female life expectancy;
- Healthy birth weight;
- Premature births;
- Patients hospitalised with coronary heart disease;
- Child healthy weight in primary 1; and
- Early deaths from cancer (<75);

With regards to each of the indicators listed above the IZ compares less favourably to other areas in Aberdeenshire and, in some instances, Scotland (and/or the trend is worsening).

## Kemnay Economic Data (1 of 3)

### Rank of Household Income per Data Zone (2023)



In terms of household income, this IZ leans towards the less affluent end of the spectrum in an Aberdeenshire context. The median household income in 2023 equated to £38,550, which is £3,206 lower than the Shire average (£41,756). However, note the IZ is home to a relatively large proportion of single person households.

Median household income ranges from £31,651 in DZ S01006889 (area either side of Bremner Way, including Kembhill Park) to £52,332 in DZ S01006890 (southwest part of town). This DZ also experienced the greatest reduction in population over the last few years; it also has the best health profile.

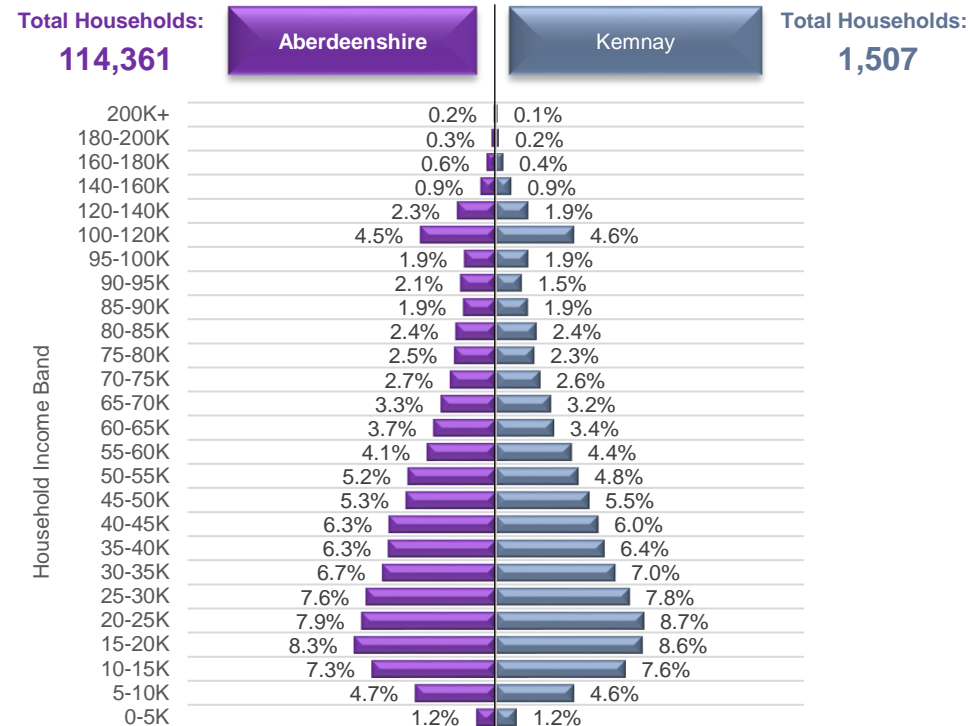
Approximately 5.8% of households in this IZ earn less than £10,000 per year, which is higher-than-average (5.3%). This equates to roughly 88 households, fewer than last year. Areas either side of Station Road and around Gordon Road tend to contain a higher-than-average proportion of such households.

High income households tend to be situated towards the southern extremities of the town (Milton View & the area around the Bowling Club).

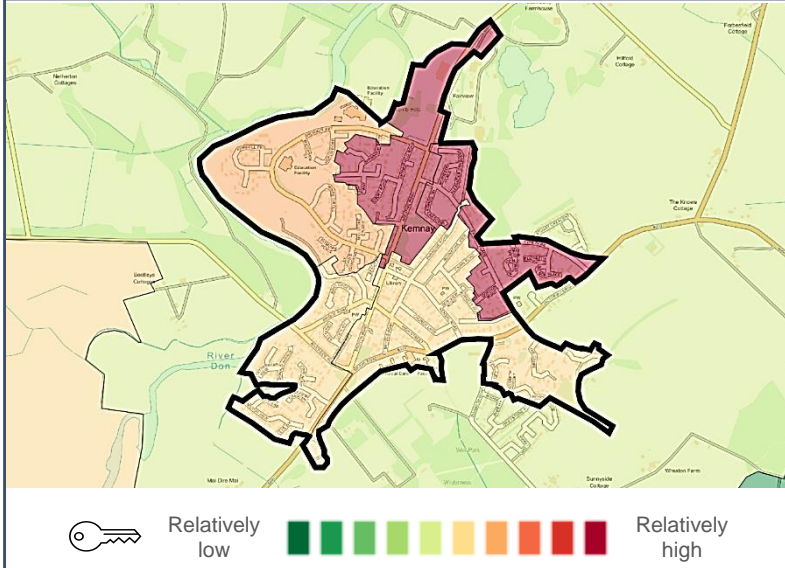

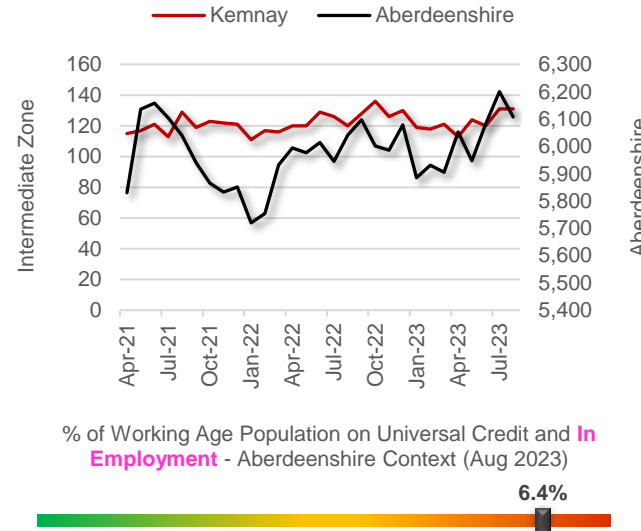

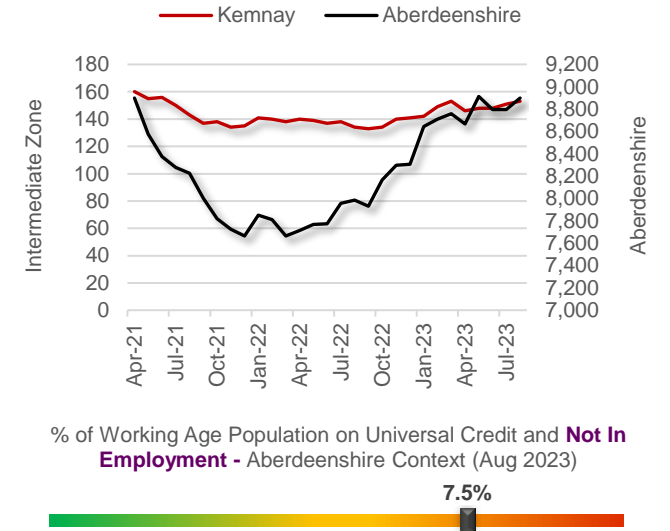
Latest Unemployment Rate - Ranking per Data Zone



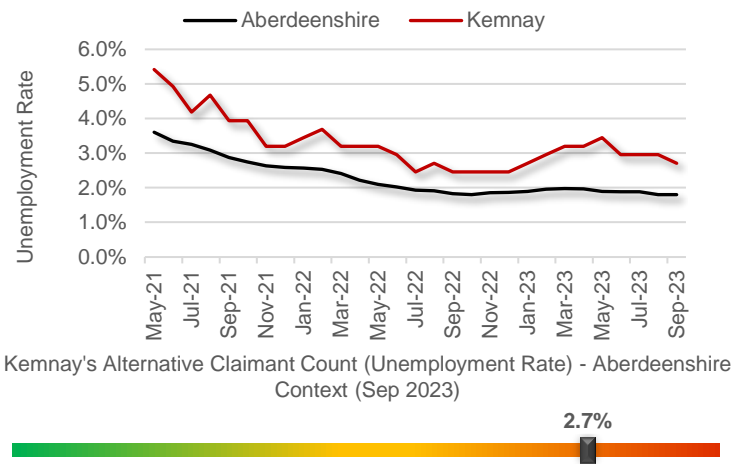
People on Universal Credit - In Employment



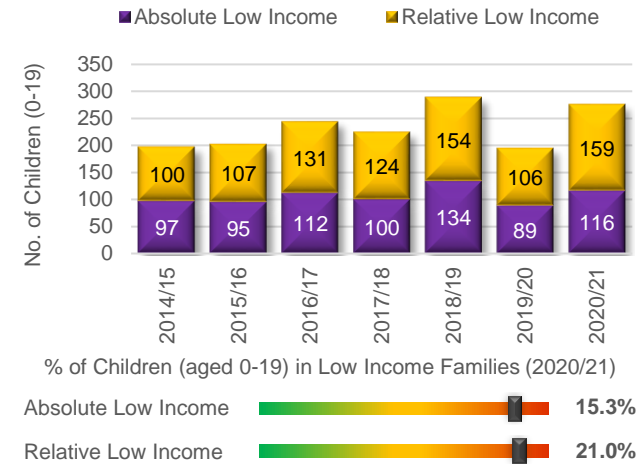
People on Universal Credit - Not In Employment

Summary

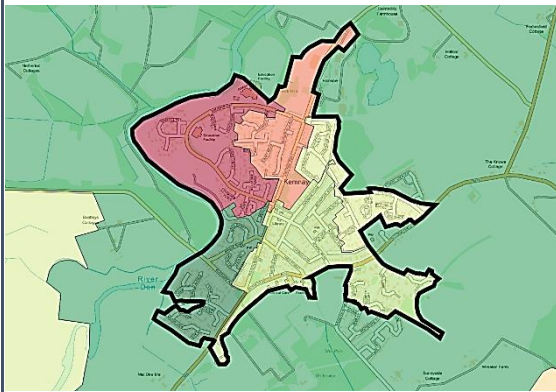
The number of people claiming Universal Credit (UC) - who are also in employment - increased at the onset of Covid and has remained elevated ever since. Latest figures show 6.4% of people aged 16-64 (who also have jobs) are claiming UC. This is one of the highest rates in Aberdeenshire. A similar story emerges in relation to people on UC and not in employment.

Like Aberdeenshire, the unemployment rate in the IZ has fallen substantially since the March 2021 peak of 5.8%. Latest data suggests approximately 2.7% of the Working Age population is currently out-of-work, which is relatively high in an Aberdeenshire context. The rate ranges from 1.4% (S01006890, which covers the southwest portion of town.) to 4.8% (S01006893, centre of town covering either side of Aquithie Road going northbound). Since Jan '20, the IZ unemployment rate has never fallen below the Aberdeenshire-wide rate.

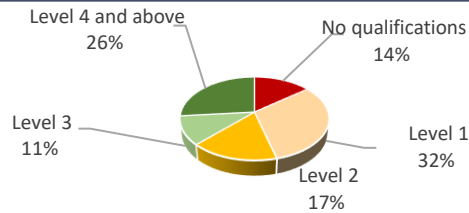
The proportion of children living in low-income households is among the highest in the Shire, and the numbers increased quite considerably year-on-year.

Summary

The employment numbers per broad industrial group relate to the kind of jobs within the area, which may be filled by those living outwith the IZ.

The IZ is home to a number of industries, the main ones being: Education, Transport and storage, and Health.

The number of jobs in the IZ has remained steady over the last few years, increasing by 3% since 2020. This is largely thanks to jobs added in the Transport & storage sector.

Common job types in the area relate to primary and secondary education; postal and courier activities; architectural and engineering activities, and residential care for the elderly and disabled. These job types account for about half the total jobs in the town.

The enterprises in this area are typically small, with most not exceeding annual sales of £200,000. This indicates that the town primarily consists of modest, independently-owned retail and service businesses. A reduction in the number of enterprises within the professional, scientific, and technical sectors has been observed, particularly in the annual sales ranges of £50,000 to £99,000 and £100,000 to £199,000.

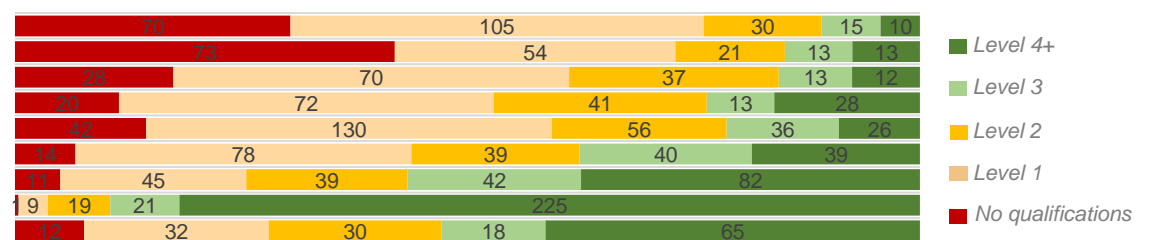

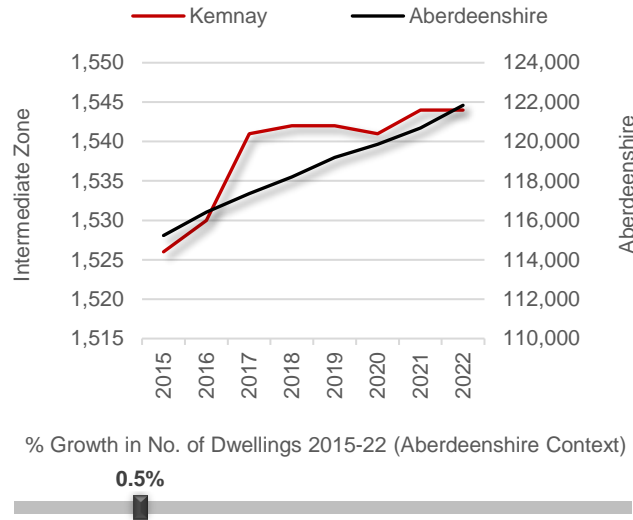
Dwellings per Hectare (2022)

Summary

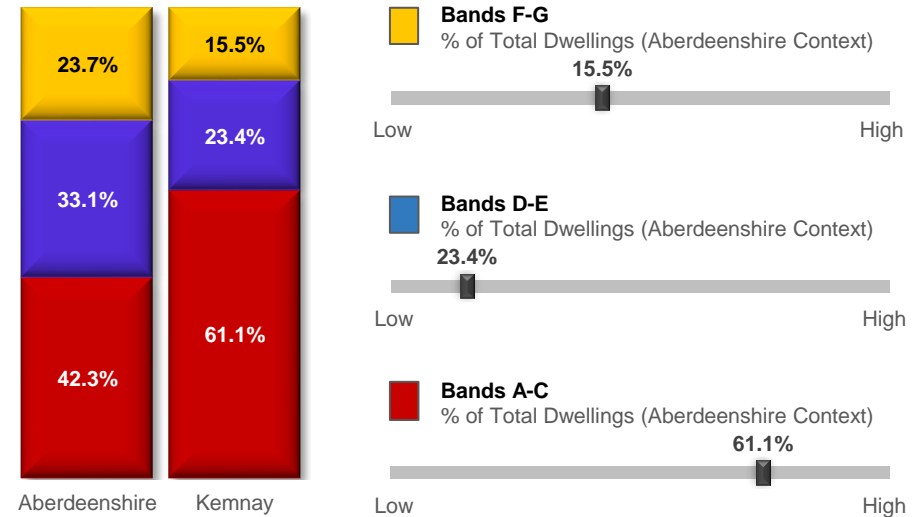
At 13.49 dwellings per hectare, this IZ is naturally on the more urban side of the spectrum given that it is considered of settlement size, one of 60+ settlements in Aberdeenshire with a population of at least 500 people.

The number of dwellings in the IZ has remained more or less flat since 2015, which is unusual relative to most other IZs in Aberdeenshire, but not an unexpected outcome given the IZ has registered a relatively significant population decline over a similar period.

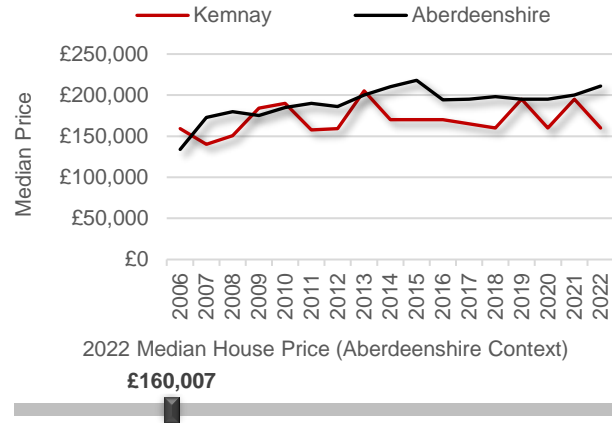
A relatively large proportion of the dwellings in this IZ (61.1%) fall within Council Tax Bands A-C. This puts the IZ towards the higher end of the spectrum in this particular regard. A relatively low proportion of dwellings (23.4%) fall within Bands D-E. This is one of the lowest proportions in Aberdeenshire.

The median house price is £160,000, which is approximately £51,000 lower than the Aberdeenshire average (£210,995).

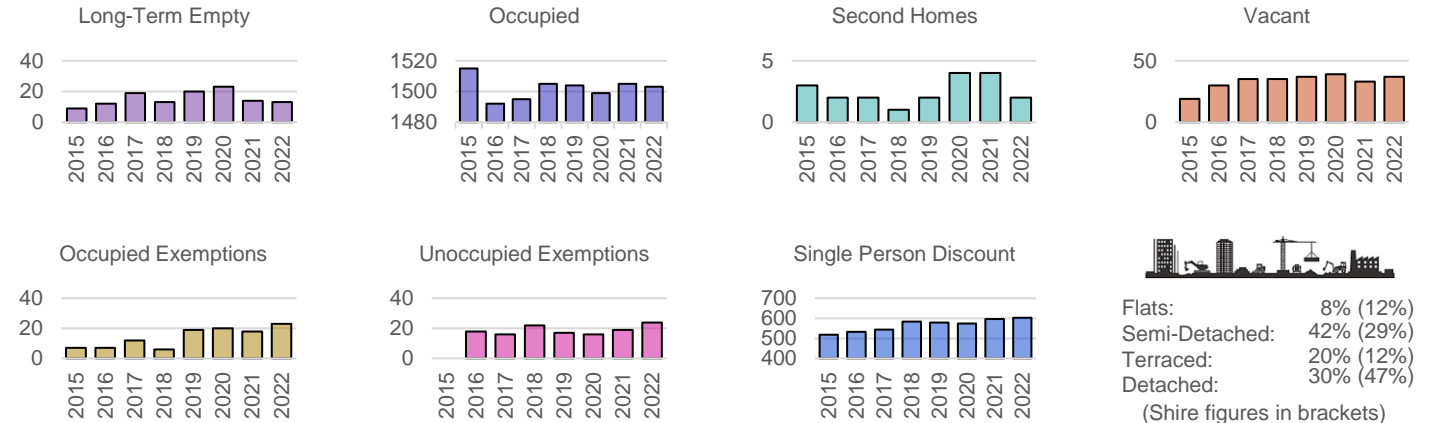
Proportion of Dwellings per Council Tax Band, 2022



Median Residential House Prices (Sales), 2006-22

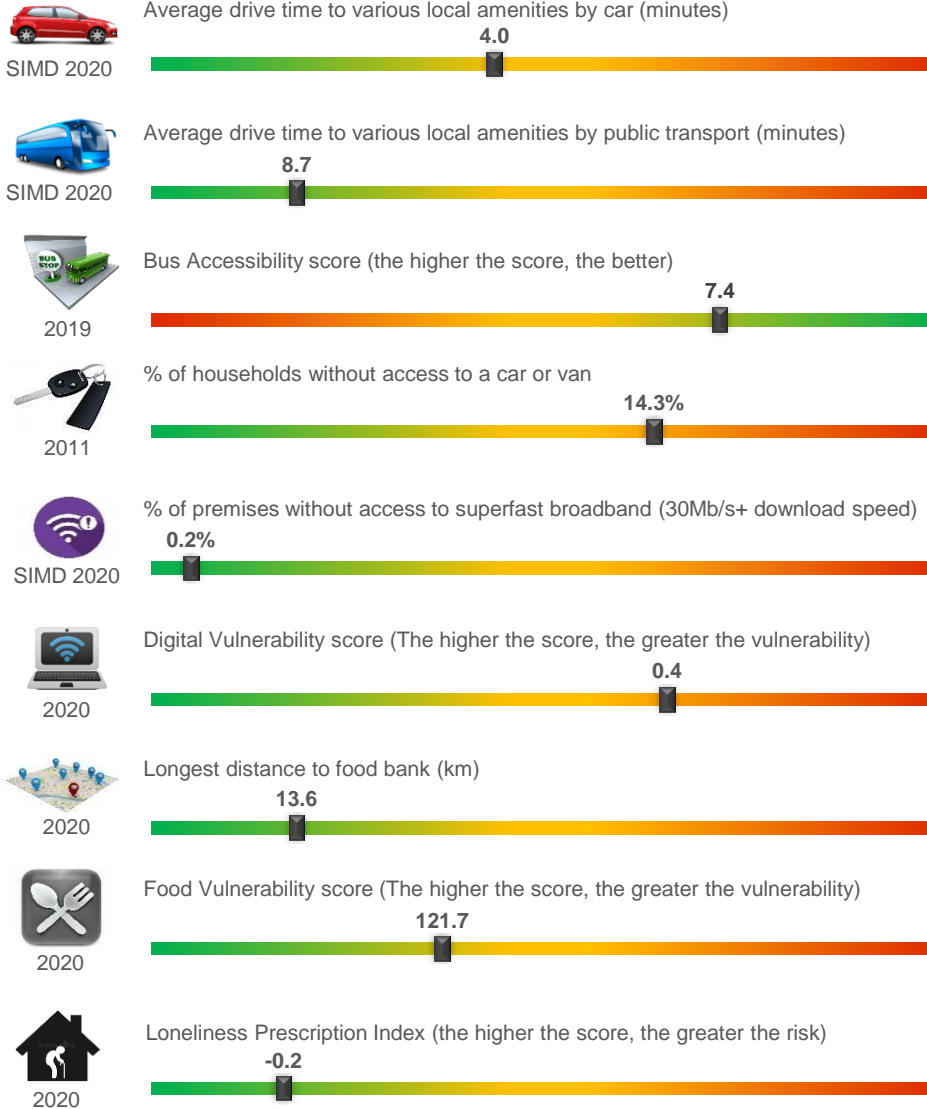

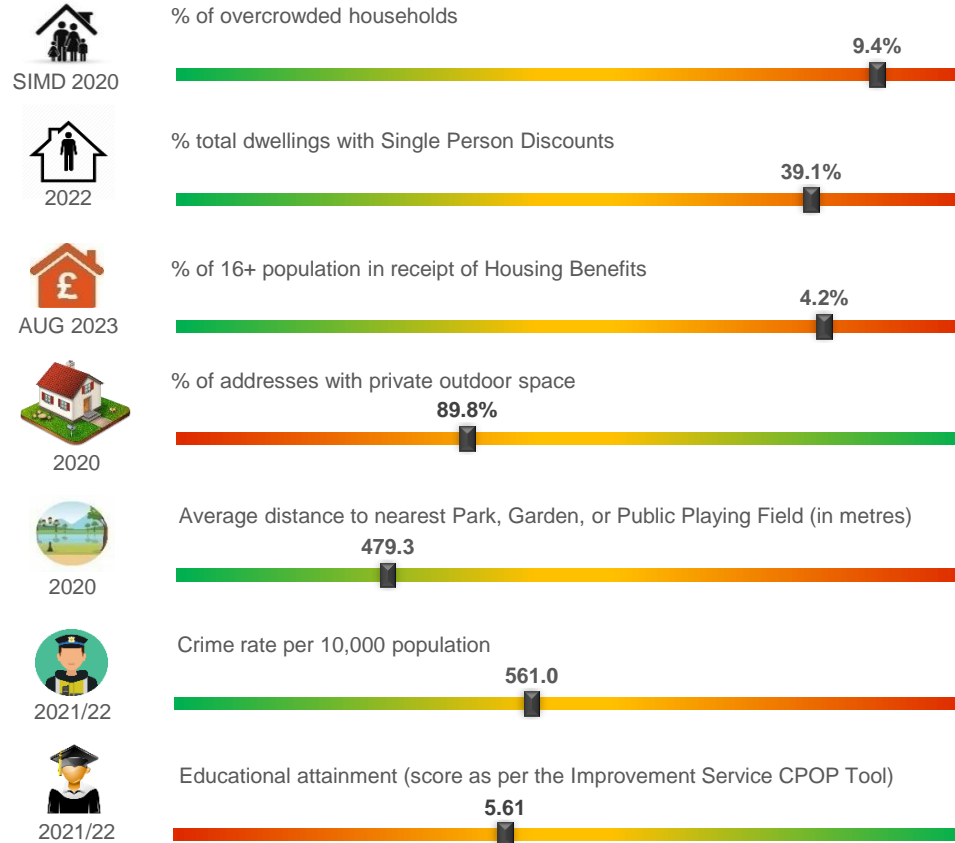

#### Summary

According to the miscellaneous socio-economic indicators on this page, the IZ appears to be well served in terms of drive times to local amenities, and bus accessibility is good. And superfast broadband is available virtually everywhere in town - some of the advantages of urban living.

On the other hand, overcrowded households tend to be more of an issue here compared to most other IZs in Aberdeenshire. The area is also home to a relatively high proportion of single person households, which may to some extent explain the lower-than-average household income in some parts of town. And a relatively high proportion of the population receiving housing benefits fits in with the economic profile of certain portions of the IZ.
