





Local Economic Drivers



Rural estates create wealth and employment across rural Scotland. This enhances wellbeing by enabling people to prosper in places where opportunities may be limited.

- ►£2.4 billion GVA and 56,300 jobs
- Core operations = £294 million GVA and 9,500 jobs
- Supply chain = £193 million GVA and 6,600 jobs
- Enterprise support = £1,892 million GVA and 40,200 jobs
- Rural Estates' Contribution to Scotland's > 80% impact in rural beareas
- 1 in 10 rural jobs

➤ Secure and satisfying work

- Average length of service for estate staff = 15 years
- 95% earn at least the living wage

> Entrepreneurial activity

• One in five estates provide space for local businesses






Rural estates help sustain the wellbeing of future generations by protecting and enhancing Scotland's natural environment and supporting the roll out of renewables

- ≥ 4 out of 5 estates engaged in conservation
- Sustainable agriculture and land management
- Habitat restoration
- Wildlife conservation
- ► 64 accredited Wildlife Estates
- ≥96 protected nature sites
- ≥£35.1 billion natural capital assets
- 17% of Scottish total

Rural estates provide homes across rural Scotland, supporting population retention and wellbeing by helping to create resilient communities that people enjoy living in

- ➤ Rural estates provide homes for c. 13,000 families
- 760 new homes (including at least 210 affordable homes)
- ➤ Vital role in rural population retention
- > Leaders in public interest led development
- Enabling £16.6 million capital investment




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Gateways to Nature





Rural estates make an important contribution to Scotland's wellbeing economy by enabling people to spend time in nature and helping them to learn from the experience.



- ➤ 5.4 million day visitors engaged in recreational activities
- 2,000 parking spaces
- 1,880 km paths
- ≥ 16,500 educational field trips
- ➤ More than 300 apprenticeships
- ➤£25.5 million value added to Scotland's stocks of human capital

Community Anchors



Rural estates play an important role in building resilient rural communities by enabling agricultural enterprises to flourish and supporting empowered communities.

- Rural estates play an active role in local community life
- 83% provide practical support like clearing snow or fallen trees
- 90% have provided space for local groups
- 65% have provided space for community events
- 52% are involved in a community council or project

➤ Add £1.2 million value to Scotland's stocks of social capital

- ➤ Provide land for c. 14,000 agricultural enterprises
- 8,950 crofts and 5,000 family farms
- cornerstones of rural community life

Growing the Contribution

Monitoring the contribution estates make to Scotland's wellbeing economy should be simple. Start by working out what matters, decide how to measure it, establish a baseline then try to improve.

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Potential Bill

- Strengthen the LRRS
- Introduce compulsory Land Management Plans
- Public interest test on transfers of large-scale land holdings
- New requirements to access public funding of large-scale land holdings
- New Land Use Tenancy
- Modernise small landholdings legislation
- Increase transparency in relation to land ownership and land use



Why target scale?

"Most of the advantages associated with Scotland's current pattern of land ownership related to the size of landholdings and most of the disadvantages related to the concentration of social, economic and decision-making power"

"While many people equate concern about the scale and concentration of landholdings with hostility toward private ownership, the two issues are distinct. The risks of concentrated power can apply regardless of the sector of ownership"

Role of Private Finance

"The finance gap for nature in Scotland for the next decade has been estimated to be £20 billion.

"Leveraging responsible private investment...will be absolutely vital to meeting our climate targets and restoring our natural environment.

Land Use Tenancy

- Enable land to be managed for environmental benefit and schemes
- Can be land within Ag holdings tenancy, or outwith
- Would move from secure tenancy to new land use tenancy
- Greater freedom to agree terms of agreement
- Must be mutually agreed
- Enables work outwith definition of agriculture
- Some concerns around long term agreements.
