






EAST GARIOCH STATISTICAL SUMMARY

Overall Vulnerability per Theme	MMW Summary
<p>Overall COVID Vulnerability Spectrum (Based on 2 major studies)</p> <p>Less Vulnerable  More Vulnerable</p> <p>10.5</p>	<p>Ward 12 – East Garioch is the second least vulnerable Ward in Aberdeenshire behind Westhill and District. Many of the indicators are at or below the Aberdeenshire average. All Intermediate Zones (IZ) in this Ward are in the least vulnerable quadrant in terms of overall COVID vulnerability. Median household incomes are high, however in the 65+ age group the average pension credit per week is the highest in Aberdeenshire.</p>
<p>Overall Age Vulnerability Spectrum (Based on 2 indicators)</p> <p>Less Vulnerable  More Vulnerable</p> <p>10.5</p>	<p>The highest proportion of people aged 65+ in East Garioch is below the Aberdeenshire average. Newmachar and Fintray has a higher percentage of residents 65+ relative to Attendance Allowance (AA) cases with entitlement which gives it a higher weighted rank 24 (out of 59) percentage of 65+ pop relative to Total Population and 65+ pop receiving AA.</p>
<p>Overall Health Vulnerability Spectrum (Based on 28 indicators)</p> <p>Less Vulnerable  More Vulnerable</p> <p>21.1</p>	<p>In terms of Health vulnerability Ward 12 is the least vulnerable health wise in Aberdeenshire. To put it into context it has a value of 10.5 and Fraserburgh and District 100. As of 31st July, there have been three COVID-19 deaths reported in the Ward – the second lowest in Aberdeenshire.</p>
<p>Overall Economic Vulnerability Spectrum (Based on 15 indicators)</p> <p>Less Vulnerable  More Vulnerable</p> <p>10.5</p>	<p>Ward 12 is ranked as average when looking at economic vulnerability in Aberdeenshire. However, there are some differences across the Ward. All three IZs have relatively high average median incomes between £46,991 and £51,349. The unemployment rate rose by 1% which is the lowest in the Aberdeenshire.</p>
<p>Overall Other Socio-Economic Vulnerability Spectrum (Based on 30 indicators)</p> <p>Less Vulnerable  More Vulnerable</p> <p>5.3</p> <p>100 = Most Vulnerable MMW in Aberdeenshire</p>	<p>In socio-economic vulnerability terms the indicators rank Ward 12 as the least vulnerable of the 19 wards. As seen on page 7, the average drive time in Ward 12 is towards the top end of the scale due to the more rural nature of the area. The drive time by public transport is just over 11 mins longer than by car however the Bus Accessibility score is low, and most households have access to a car or van.</p> <p>Almost 15% of premises are without access to superfast broadband but digital vulnerability is very low. Food vulnerability is low and the average distance to a foodbank is 12.5km. The percentage of addresses with private outdoor space is among the bottom 45% in Aberdeenshire.</p>

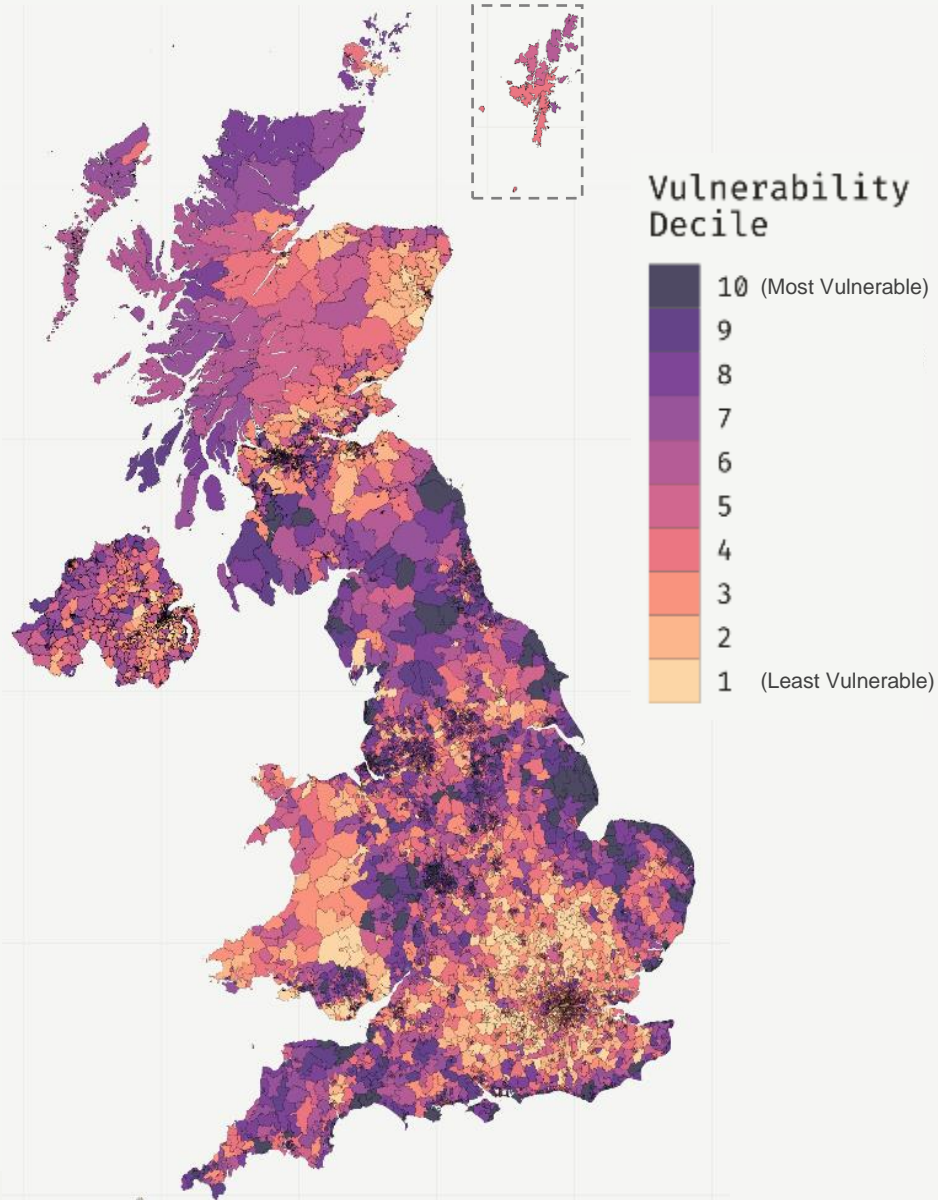

Multi-Member Ward Overall COVID Vulnerability Spectrum

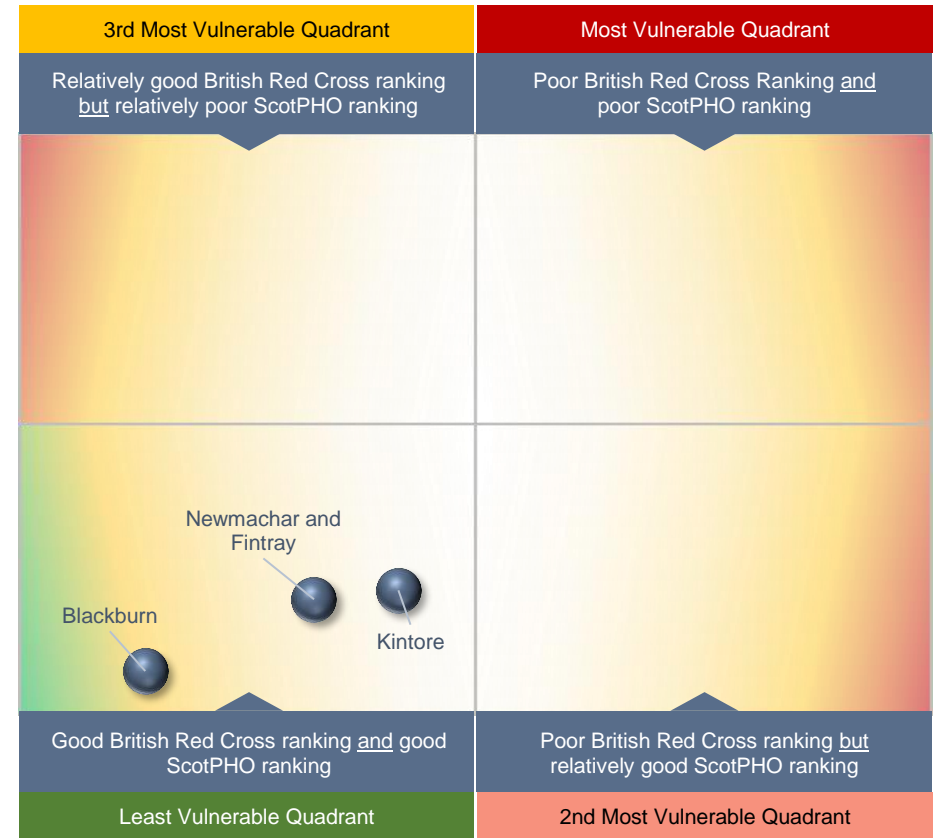

Summary

On the overall COVID Vulnerability Spectrum this is one of the least vulnerable Wards. All three IZs are found within the least vulnerable quadrant. Blackburn is the least vulnerable followed by Newmachar and Fintray and Kintore. East Garioch is the second least vulnerable Ward in Aberdeenshire, has one of the highest median household incomes and one of the lowest unemployment rates (May 2020).

In the 65+ age group, the average pension credit amount paid out to eligible 65+ residents is the highest in Aberdeenshire at £54.97 per week as is the number of Pension Credit Cases as a % of 65+ population.

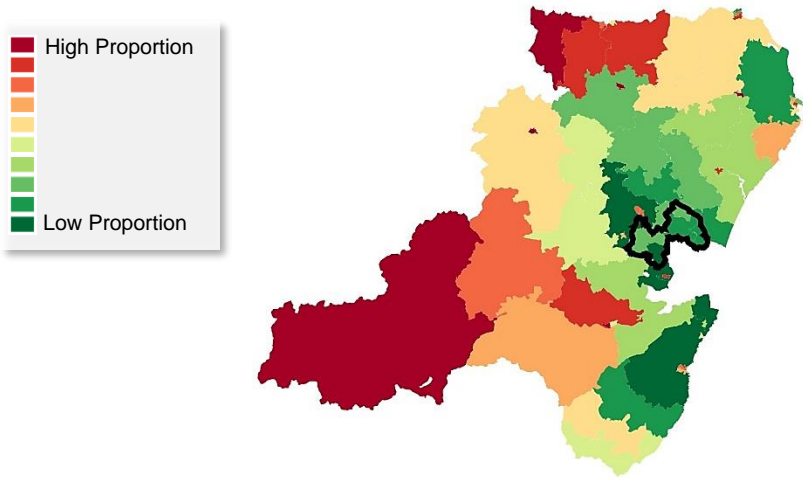

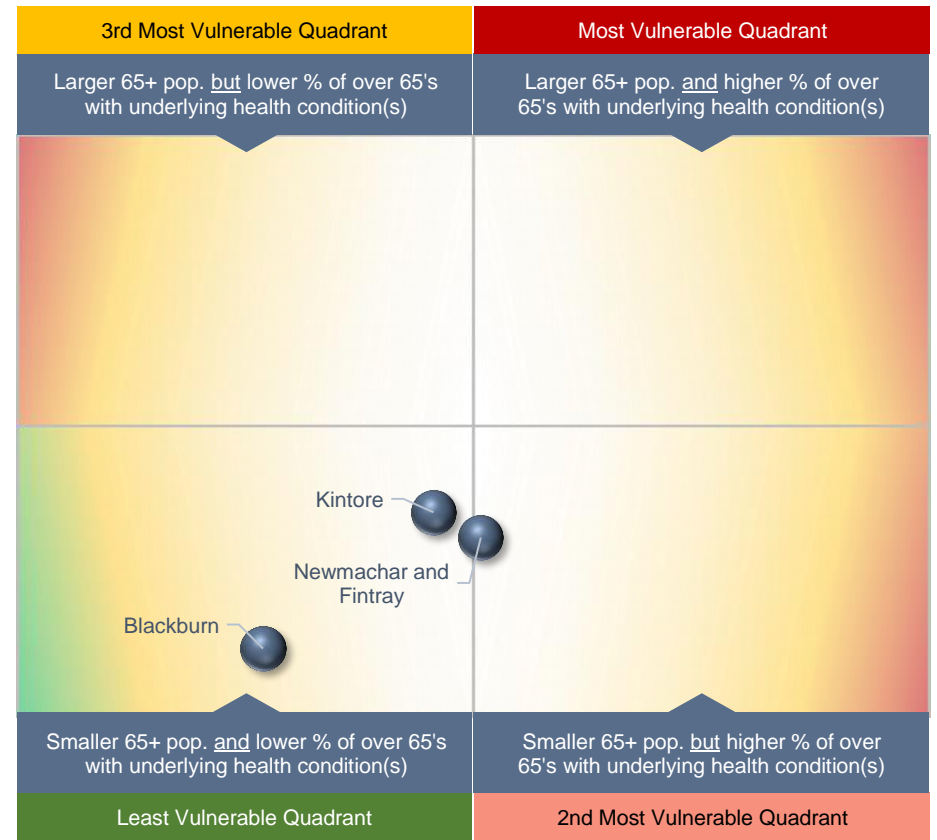
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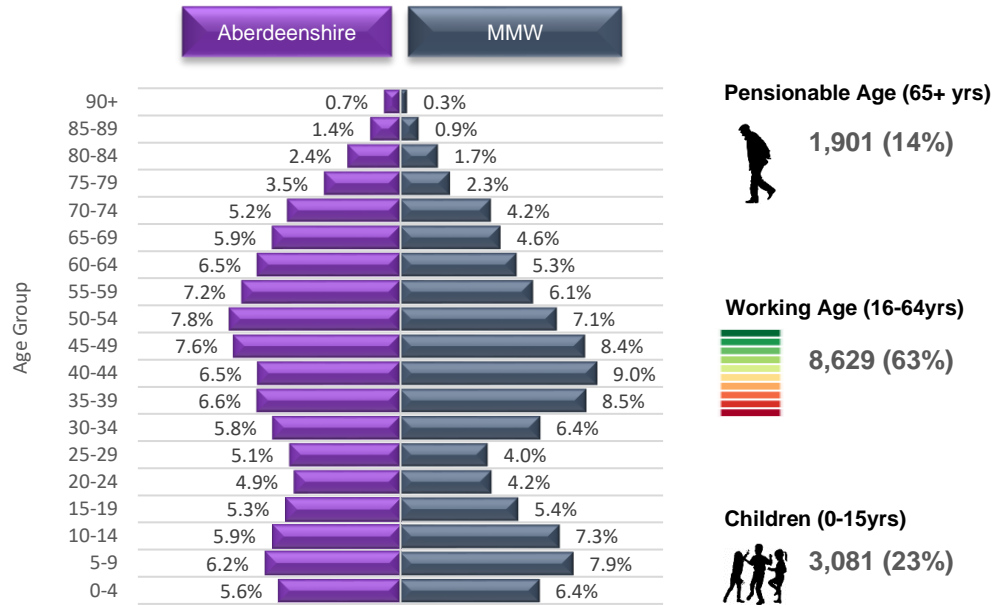
Map of Multi-Member Ward Intermediate Zones – 65+ population, 2018

Summary

The Intermediate Zones within this Ward are among the least vulnerable in Aberdeenshire, according to the age vulnerability indicators. In East Garioch, Kintore is home to the highest proportion of people aged 65+ (15.8%), IZ Blackburn has 9.9% of population 65+ and Newmachar and Fintray 14.7%.

All areas contain similar a below average proportion of over 65's in receipt of Attendance Allowance payments. Rates range from 5% in Blackburn to 7.6% in Newmachar and Fintray. Across the Council area percentages vary from 3.2% to 13.5%. As can be seen from the map on the left, East Garioch has a low proportion of people aged 65+.

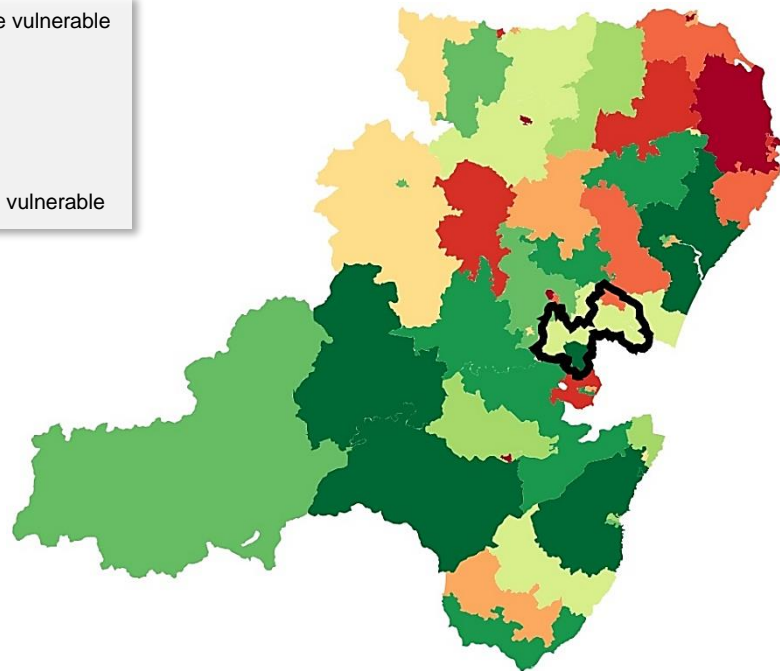

Multi-Member Ward Health Vulnerability Spectrum

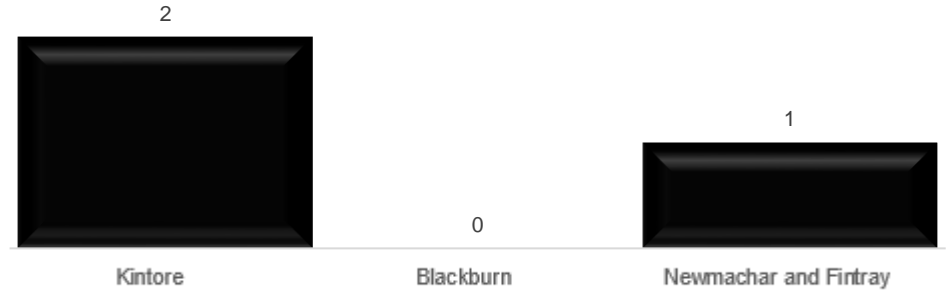

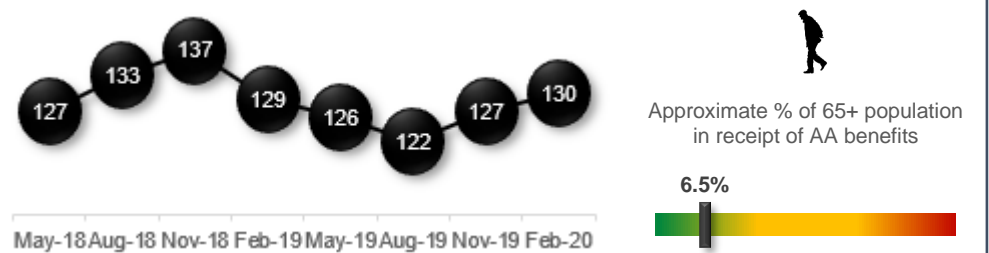
Map of Multi-Member Ward Intermediate Zones – Overall Health Ranking

Summary

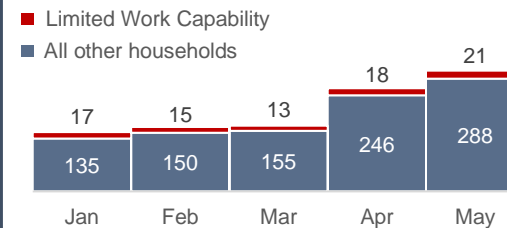
Most health-related indicators suggest the general population within the Ward is relatively healthy. A relatively small proportion of the 65+ population receive Attendance Allowance benefits (6.5% - 2nd lowest proportion for a Ward in Aberdeenshire), and a small proportion of the working age population receive Personal Independence Payments (2.1% - the lowest rate in Aberdeenshire).

Approximately 21 households in the area receive Universal Credit based on Limited Work Capability (due to physical or mental health issues). This equates to 6.8% of total households that receive Universal Credit Payments, which is the lowest in Aberdeenshire.

East Garioch has recorded 3 COVID-related deaths so far, which is the 2nd lowest in Aberdeenshire.

No. of Households in receipt of Universal Credit (2020)

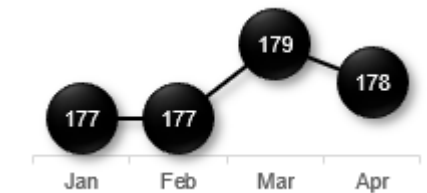


% of Households where at least 1 occupant has limited work capability

% of Working Age Population (16-64) Receiving PIPs



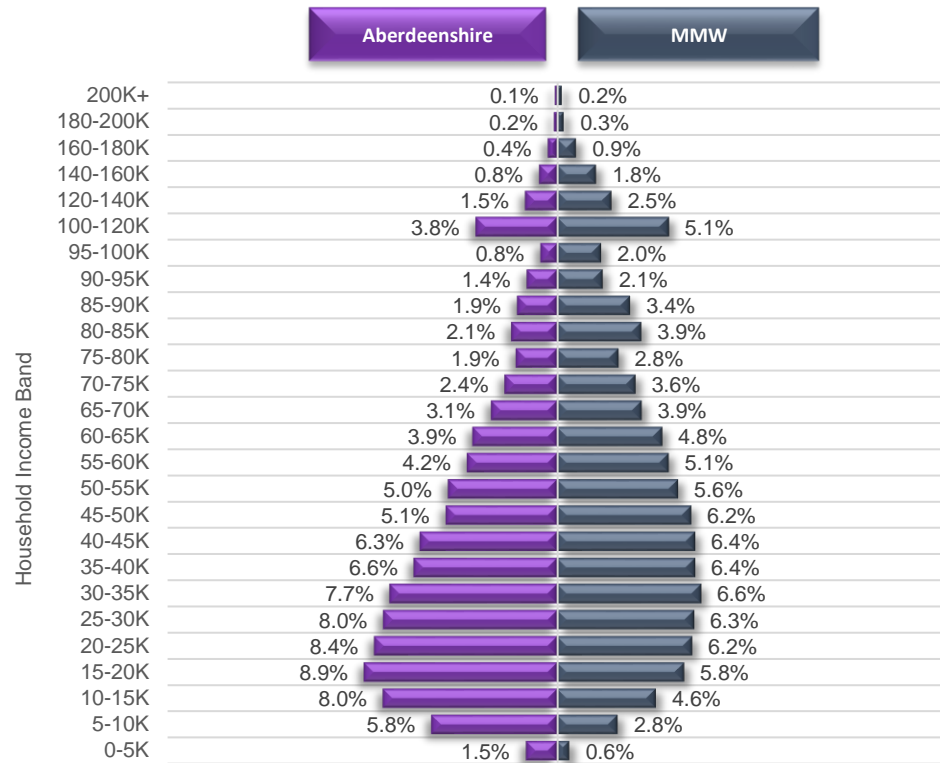

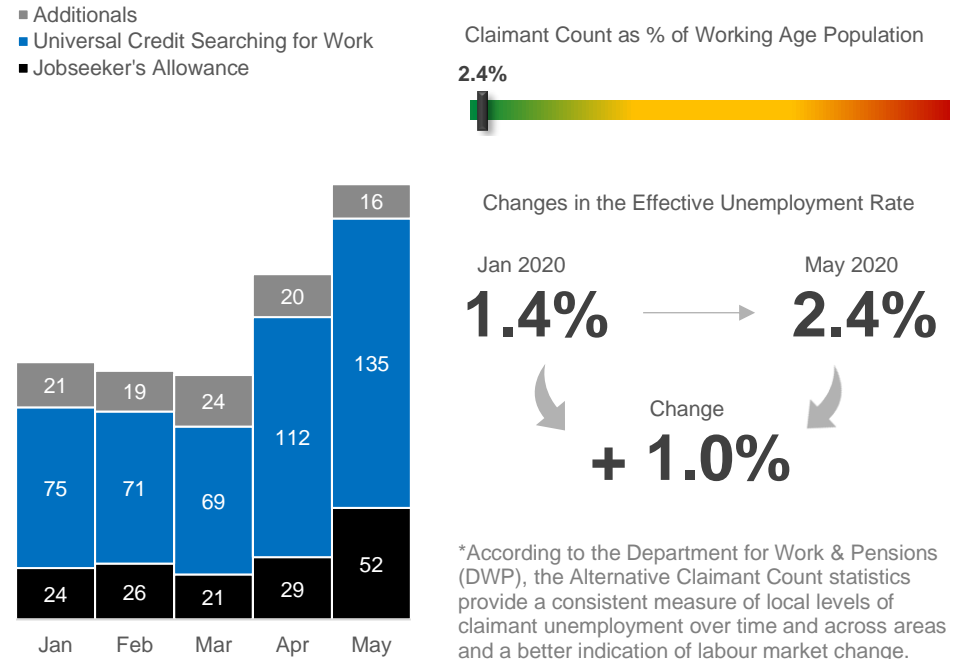


Median Household Income per Income Band - Percentage of Households (2019)

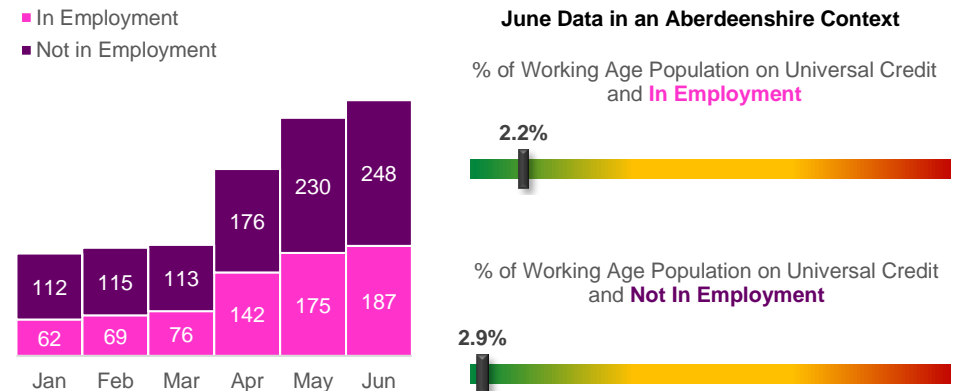


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Alternative Claimant Count* per Benefit Group - 'Unemployment Rate'(2020)

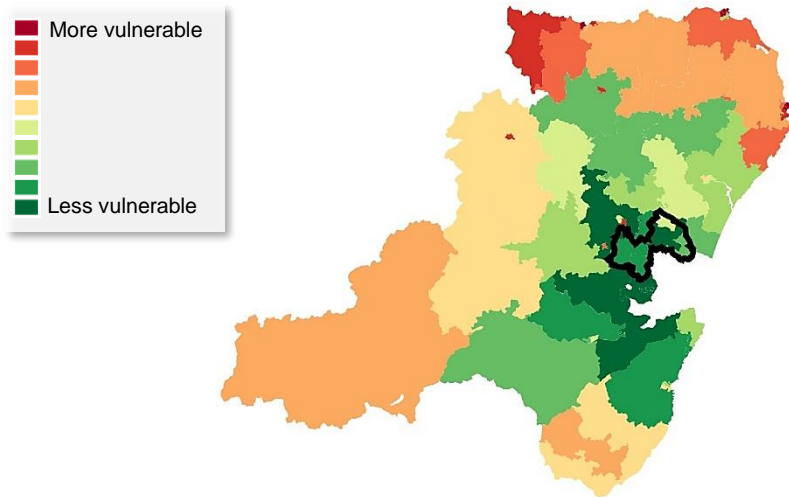

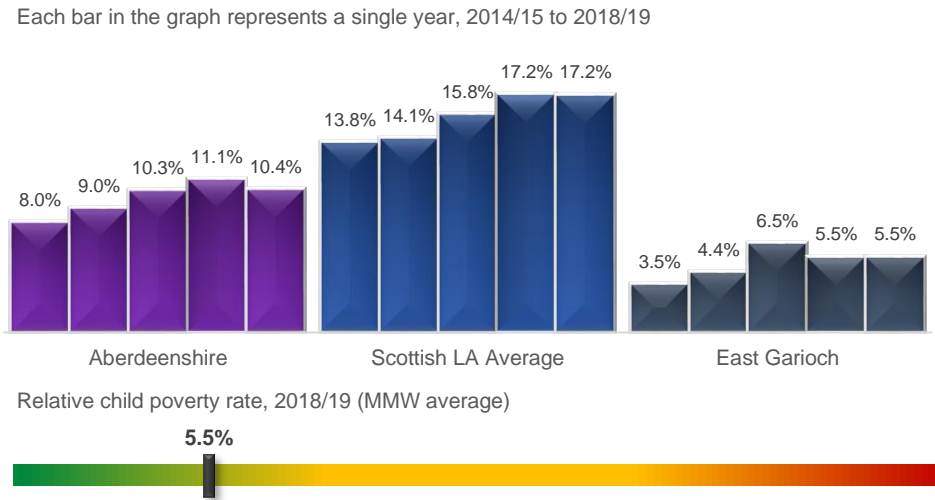

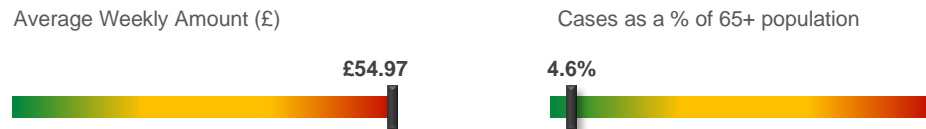
Map of Multi-Member Ward Intermediate Zones - Overall Economic Ranking



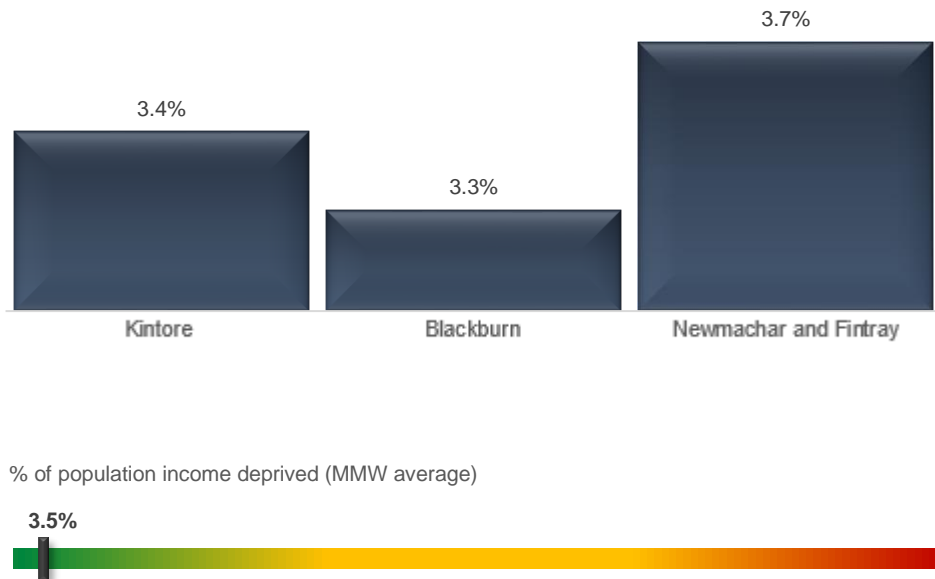
Percentage of Children in Low Income Families (Relative Poverty), 2014/15 to 2018/19

Summary

In economic terms, this Ward is 2nd lowest in terms of Economic vulnerability. The proportion of households earning less than £20,000 is way below the average as is the income deprivation rate and the unemployment rate (May 2020). The change in unemployment is the lowest in the Ward – 1%. Median household income is above the average in all three IZs ranging from £41,228 to £48,956, and the child poverty rate is low. The proportion of people on Universal Credit suggests the area is much less vulnerable than most in Aberdeenshire.


































This is to some extent reflected in the indicators on the next page. The average drive time for car and bus is higher than most and the Bus Accessibility score is low. The percentage of addresses with private outdoor space is among the bottom 45% in Aberdeenshire.
