






# NORTH KINCARDINE STATISTICAL SUMMARY

<p><b><u>COVID Vulnerability Spectrum (3rd Best)</u></b></p> <p style="text-align: center;">15.8</p> <p>Less Vulnerable  More Vulnerable</p>	<p>Ward 17 – North Kincardine is the 3<sup>rd</sup> least vulnerable Ward in Aberdeenshire. The Overall COVID Vulnerability Index puts North Kincardine at 15.8. To put it into context the two remaining wards in Kincardine and Mearns Area - Stonehaven and Lower Deeside and Mearns rank 47.4 and 52.6 respectively. The overall Age, Health, Economic and Socio-economic vulnerabilities are similarly less vulnerable. Four of the five Intermediate Zones (IZ) in this Ward are in the least vulnerable quadrant in terms of overall COVID vulnerability. Median household incomes are high, however in the 65+ age group the average pension credit per week is way below the average in Aberdeenshire.</p> <p>The proportion of people aged 65+ ranges from 10.1% in Banchory-Devenick and Findon to 18.6% in Newtonhill and all are below the average for Aberdeenshire. Only the Portlethen IZ has an above average proportion of over 65's in receipt of Attendance Allowance (AA) payments (10.4% against an average of 8.2%). The rest range from the third lowest in Aberdeenshire at 3.9% - Dunecht, Durris and Drumoak to 7.9% - Banchory-Devenick and Findon.</p> <p>In terms of overall Health vulnerability Ward 17 is not vulnerable - it has a value of 15.8 and Fraserburgh and District 100. As of 31<sup>st</sup> July, there have been three COVID-19 deaths reported in the Ward.</p> <p>North Kincardine is not vulnerable in overall economic terms. (Aberdeenshire average score 52.6). All five IZs have relatively high average median incomes between £43,552 and £57,658 and all are among the top 40% in Aberdeenshire. By May 2020 the unemployment rate in Westhill and District had risen by 1.5% to 2.6% which is the 3<sup>rd</sup> lowest in Aberdeenshire.</p> <p>The socio-economic vulnerability indicators rank Ward 17 as 16<sup>th</sup> most vulnerable. As seen on page 7, the socio economic indicators suggest that geographic access has reduced the vulnerability in North Kincardine. Average drive time to local amenities by public transport is high and the IZ Dunecht, Durris and Drumoak has the 2<sup>nd</sup> highest time (24.1mins) in Aberdeenshire. It is one of the reasons that the percentage of households without access to a car or van is low (6.6%). A potential vulnerability exists, however, in relation to the proportion of jobs in retail (14.1% of jobs are categorised as such).</p>

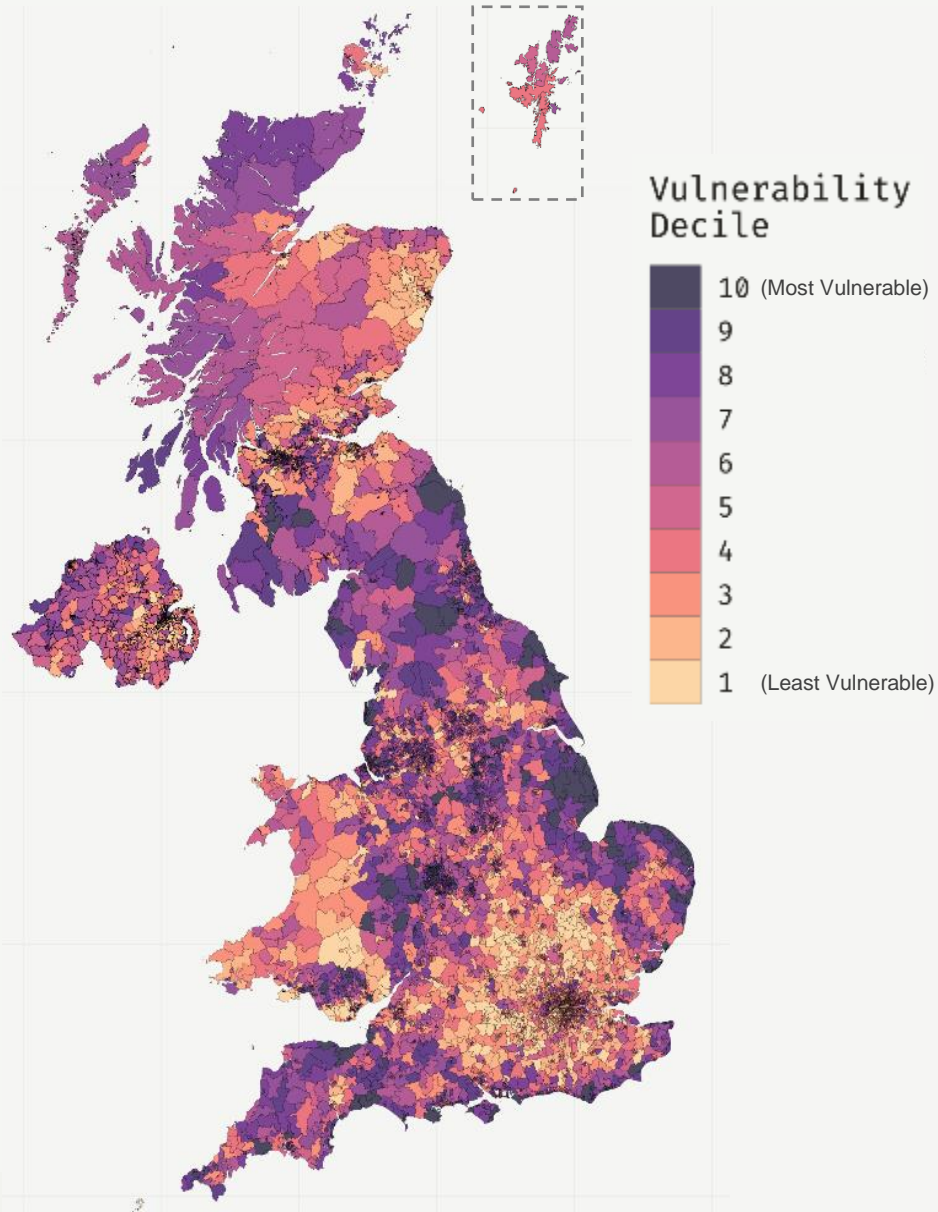

**Multi-Member Ward Overall COVID Vulnerability Spectrum**

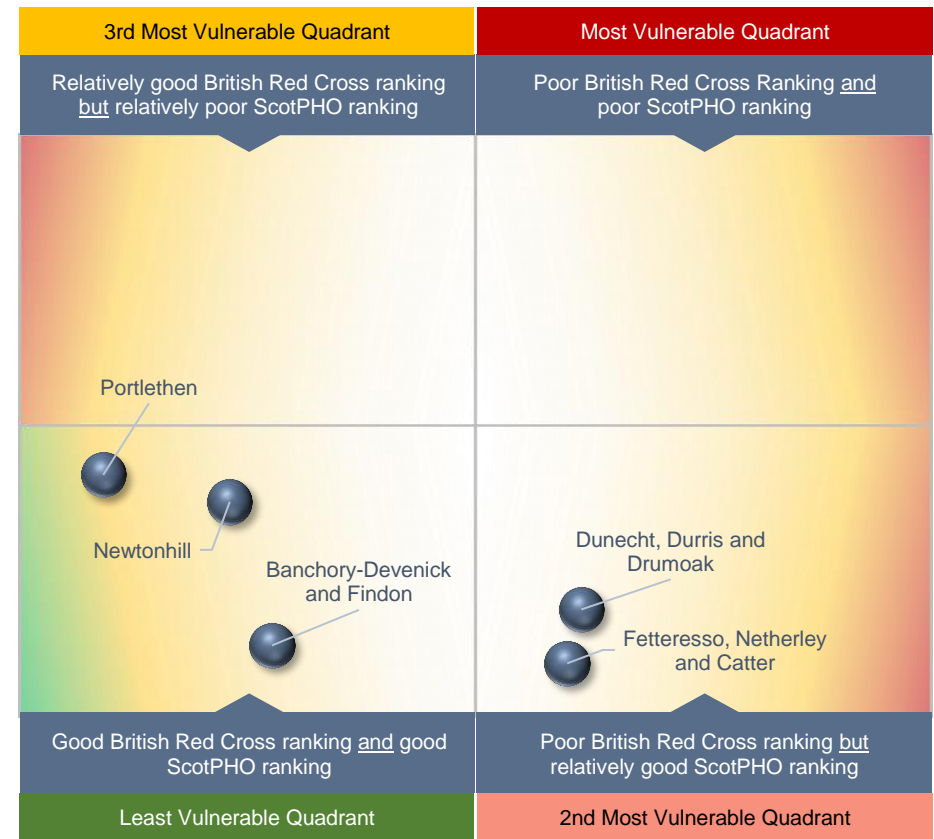

**Summary**

On the Covid Vulnerability spectrum Dunecht, Durris and Drumoak is the most vulnerable IZ. Banchory-Devenick and Findon is the least vulnerable IZ and has a much lower % of residents aged 65+.

North Kincardineshire is one of the least vulnerable Wards in Aberdeenshire on the vulnerability spectrum, with Banchory-Devenick having the second lowest % of residents over 65+.

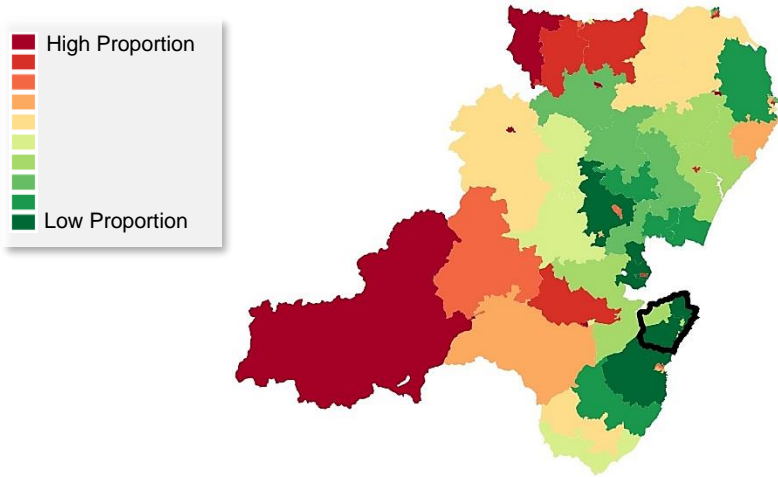

Multi-Member Ward Age Vulnerability Spectrum

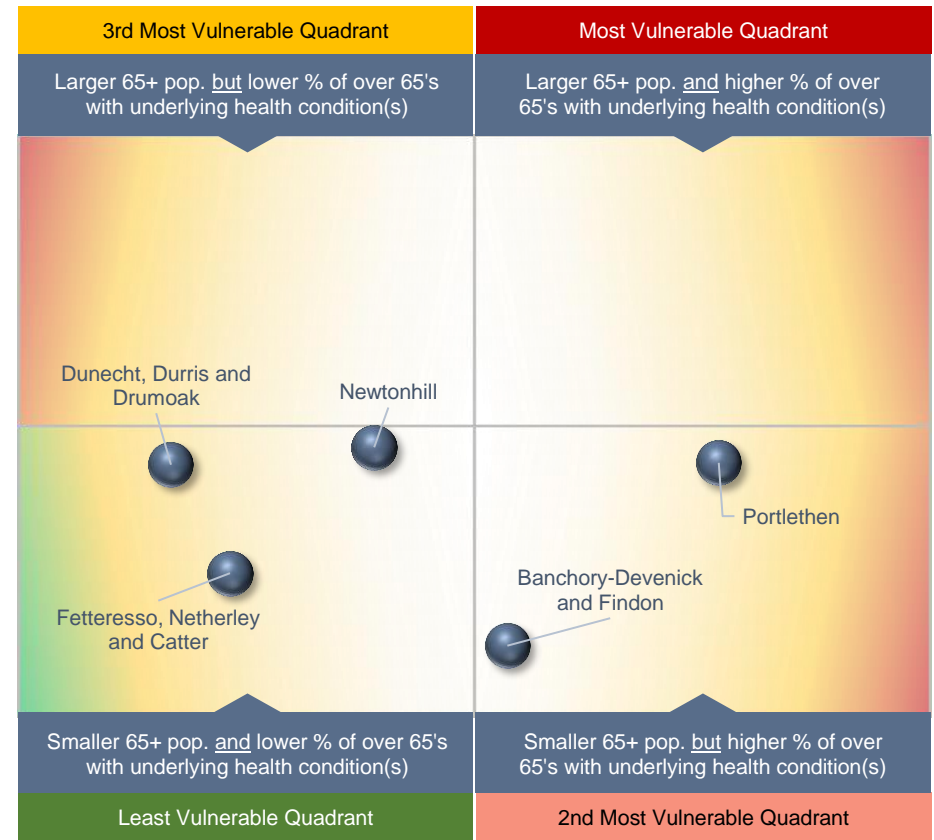

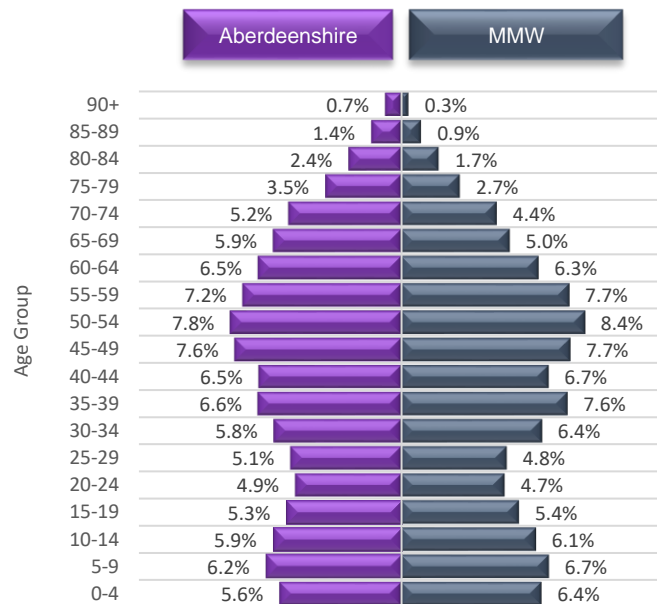
Map of Multi-Member Ward Intermediate Zones – 65+ population, 2018

Summary

The Intermediate Zones within this Ward are among the less vulnerable in Aberdeenshire, according to the age vulnerability indicators. The proportion of people aged 65+ ranges from 10.1% in Banchory-Devenick and Findon to 18.6% in Newtonhill and all are below the average for Aberdeenshire.

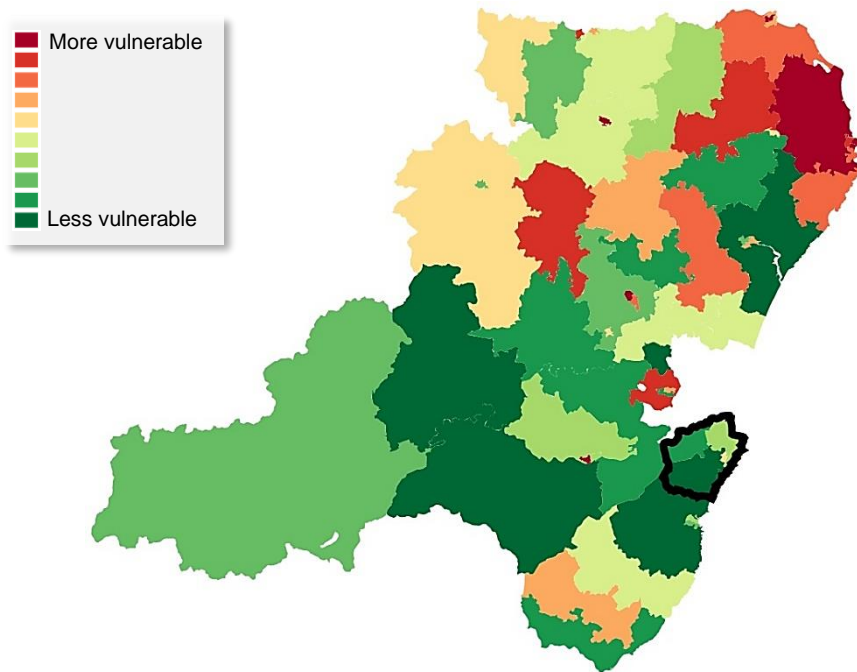

**Multi-Member Ward Health Vulnerability Spectrum**

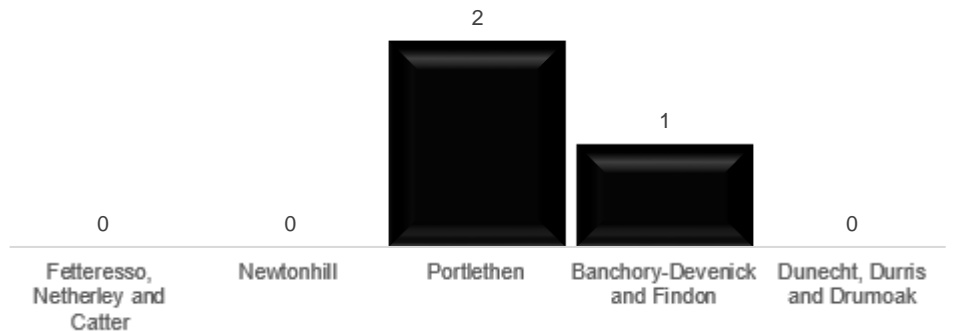
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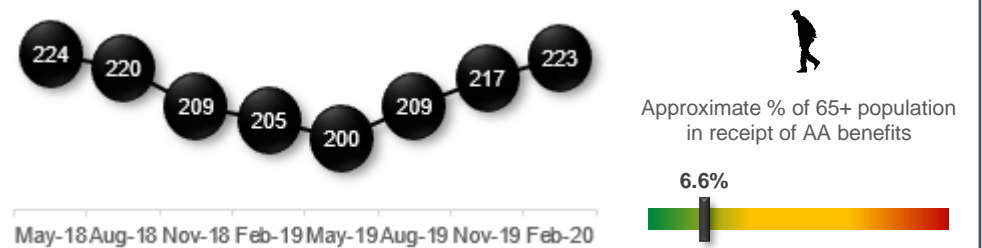
Map of Multi-Member Ward Intermediate Zones – Overall Health Ranking

**Summary**

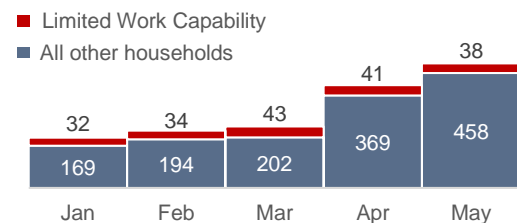
Most health related indicators suggest that the general population within the Ward is healthy. A relatively small proportion of the 65+ population receive Attendance Allowance benefits (6.6% - 4<sup>th</sup> lowest proportion for a Ward in Aberdeenshire), and a small proportion of the working age population receive Personal Independence Payments (2.2% - among the lowest rates in Aberdeenshire).

Approximately 38 households in the area receive Universal Credit based on limited Work Capability (due to physical or mental health issues). This equates to 7.7% of total households that receive Universal Credit payments, which is just below the average rate.

North Kincardine has recorded 3 COVID-related deaths so far which is below the average. It is for this reason that the Ward scores well in relation to the Health theme.

No. of Households in receipt of Universal Credit (2020)

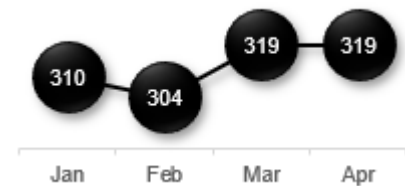


% of Households where at least 1 occupant has limited work capability

% of Working Age Population (16-64) Receiving PIPs

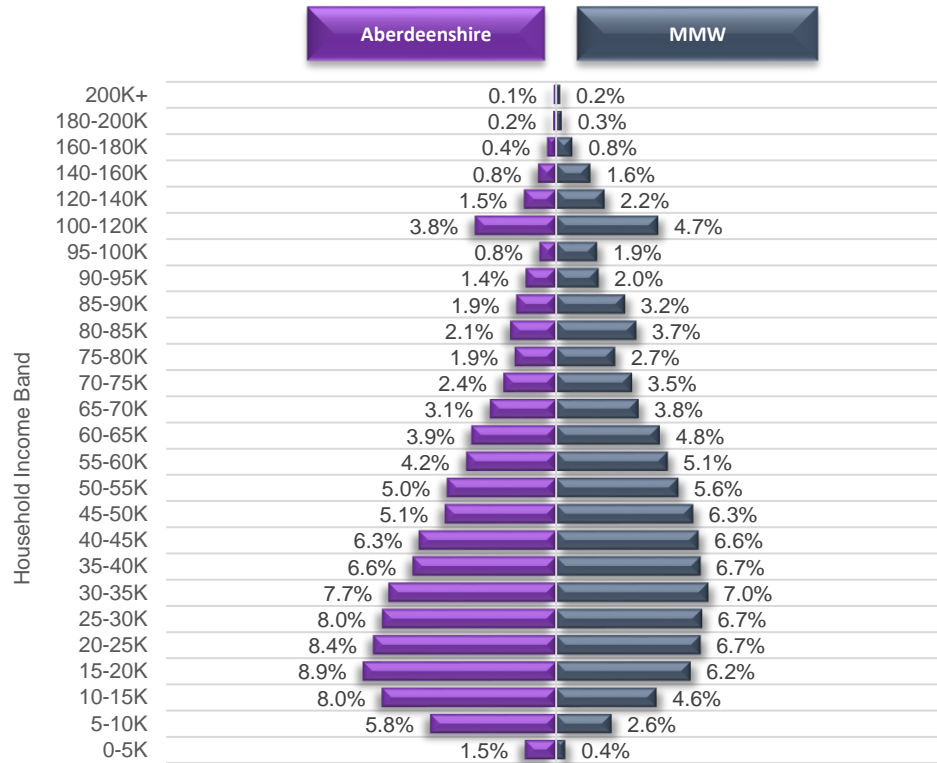


**Multi-Member Ward Economic Vulnerability Spectrum**

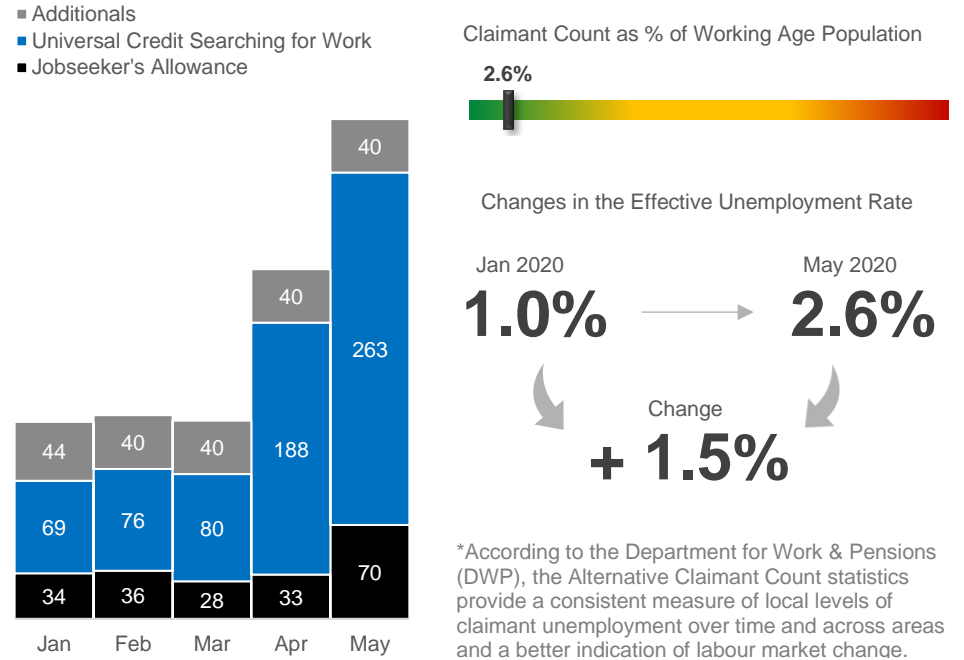


**Median Household Income per Income Band - Percentage of Households (2019)**

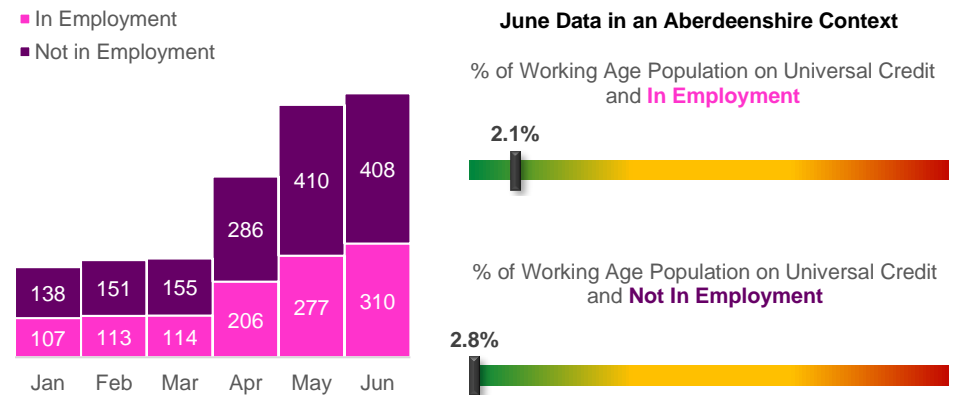


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**Alternative Claimant Count\* per Benefit Group - 'Unemployment Rate'(2020)**

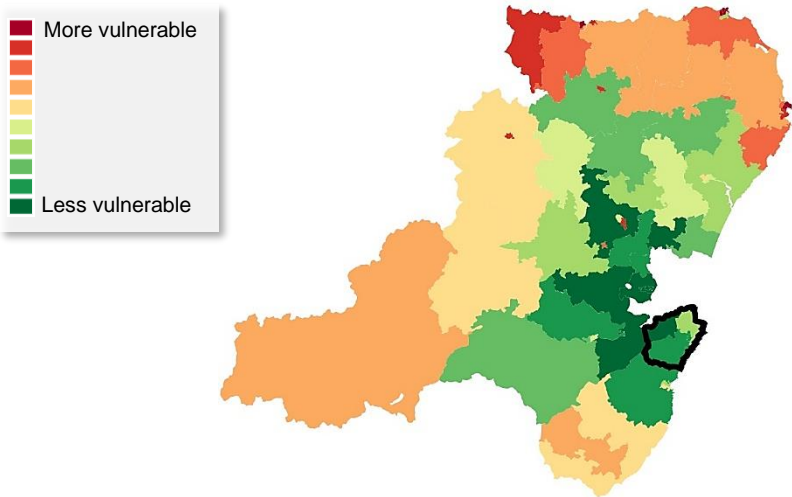

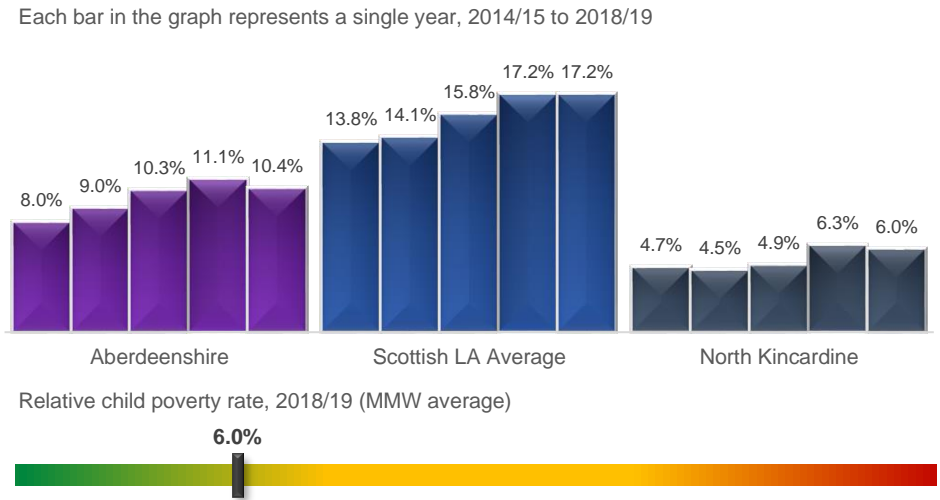

Pension Credit Benefits - Proxy Indicator for 'Pensioner Poverty' (February 2020)

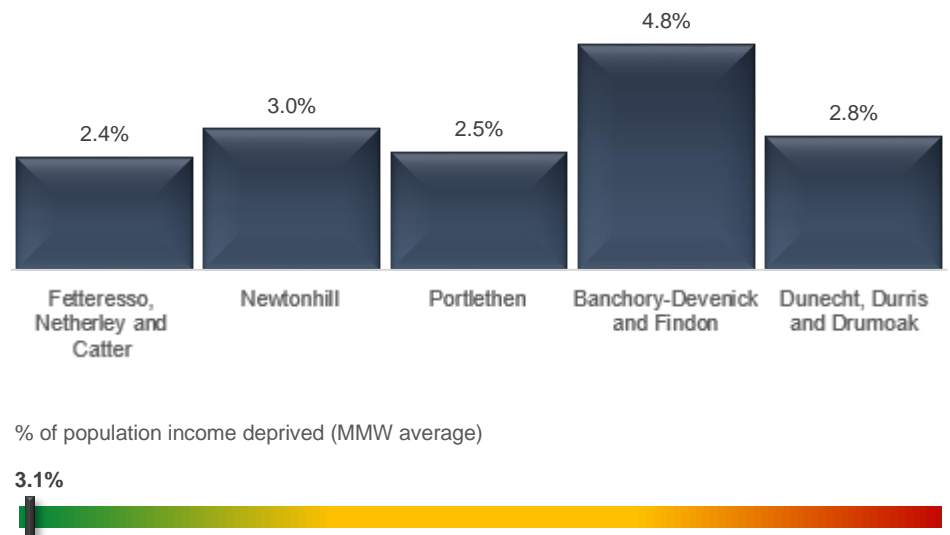


Summary

In economic terms, this Ward is less vulnerable with various indicators near the Aberdeenshire average. The proportion of households earning less than £20,000 is below the average, as is the income deprivation rate, child poverty rate and the unemployment rate (May 2020). Median household income is above the average. Pensioner poverty, as defined above and the proportion of people on Universal Credit suggests the area is more affluent.

This is to some extent reflected in the indicators on the next page. Average drive time to local amenities by public transport is high and the IZ Dunecht, Durris and Drumoak has the 2<sup>nd</sup> highest time (24.1mins) in Aberdeenshire. It is one of the reasons that the percentage of households without access to a car or van is low (6.6%). A potential vulnerability exists, however, in relation to the proportion of jobs in retail (14.1% of jobs are categorised as such, among the higher proportions in Aberdeenshire).
