Your comments

My comments are regarding the proposed new settlement extension OUTSIDE the foot print of New Byth.

- 1) You authorised the destruction of the New Byth school supposedly to make way for a housing development , **WHICH NEVER TOOK PLACE.** the sole aim of this project, in my opinion of filling someone's pockets with zero consideration for the inhabitants.
- 2) your own policy says that the inhabitants do not want the village/settlement foot print increased until all the vacant sites **WITHIN** the village footprint have been filled.
Your proposal **flies** in the face of the inhabitants wishes which you must admit.
- 3) the only way that access could be achieved is to create a cross roads at the square and this involves a 90 degrees blind bend one way and in my opinion would be a backwards and potentially dangerous scenario for traffic as a lot of vehicles travel at considerable speed and some tractor trailer drivers even drive on the grass by over a meter due to oncoming cars speeding round the bend, or their inability to keep within the confines of the tarred road. Check the wheel destroyed verge at the corner in question.
- 4) this also takes out of use valuable prime agricultural land which cannot ever be replaced as it is finite. This goes against all that is holy in the planning world, why destroy prime agricultural land if not for some inexplicable reason.
- 4) In our so called caring world this would not be of any help for the bio diversity of the area and would not help the flora and fauna one little bit.
This would be a backward and destructive step.
- 5) The village/settlement would benefit much more and get no adverse comments if a shop/post office were to be built as this would be an asset to the whole area.
- 6) At present we have almost a zero bus service with one bus daily and only when the schools are open.
- 7) when all the **BROWN** field spaces have been used up then and only then will it make sense to build on prime agricultural land but in a sensible way and manner.
- 8) It is very easy to word any application to suit the proposers needs such as "the land has no association to a working farm" which is incorrect as a flock of sheep are usually associated with farming as is cropping hay.
