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## Goals and structure of supply chain dialogue

- Work package 4 of LOWINFOOD project focuses on fish and seafood supply chain aims to improving value of biomaterials along the fish supply chain in Scotland.
- The whole-chain **stakeholder dialogue** explores hotspots loss and waste, scope for cooperation opportunities between actors to improve the value of seafood products and by-products, build new relationships, and promote awareness and adoption of innovations





# T4.1. Stakeholder dialogue: Preliminary findings in Scotland

- 24 organisations interviewed in and around fish and seafood supply chain in Scotland, 6 organisations recruited for the stakeholder dialogue, 4 industry events
- > Two categories of losses:
- 1. Products intended for human consumption that become unfit all actors are interested in preventing this
- 2. By-product of processes little or no current market value to generate additional income
- Scepticism as to whether more regulation or stricter rules could reduce FLW implementation rather than regulation
- Utilization of side streams not always interesting enough economically or feasible – logistic and storage issues, shortage of skilled workers


